はしがき

本研究リポートは、文部科学省科学研究費補助金・基盤研究 A(2)「文化の伝搬変容の統計科学的解析-ハワイ日系人・非日系人国際比較調査-」(代表 吉野諒三)による 1999 年度のハワイ・ホノルル住民調査の単純集計の速報を意図して発刊するものである。ハワイのホノルル住民は、統計数理研究所の調査ティームにより、過去 1971 年以来、1978 年、1988 年と不定期に継続調査されてきており、今回で 4 回目となる。

この一連の調査は、1953 年以来の統計数理研究所研究所による「日本人の国民性」の継続調査の空間的拡張として、1970 年頃にブラジル日系人調査が企画(林知己夫・元所長、鈴木達三名誉教授ら)されたことに端を発している。日本人の国民性をより深く解析するために他の国の人々と比較してみるという発想があり、また我々の行っているような意識調査において計量的に意味のある比較をするためには、ある程度似た側面と、ある程度異なっている側面をもつ社会集団をとりあげ、どのような側面がどの程度似ているのか、異なっているのかを解明することが肝要であるとの構想が浮かびあがってきたのであった。

この構想の下で、ブラジルの日系移民とその子孫たちに注目し、文部省からの補助も得て調査企画も進んだのであったが、当時、ブラジルは軍事政権下で、テロなどの社会不安もあった時代であったからであろうと思われるが、ブラジル政府から我々の調査ティームにビザがおりず、結局、この時点では「ブラジル日系人調査」は幻に終わってしまったのであった。(ただし、1991年に水野坦氏(統計数理研究所及び総務庁統計局の OB)やサンパウロ人文科学研究所の協力により「ブラジル日系人調査」が遂行されて、研究所リポート No.70 として報告されている。)このため、急遽、米国ハワイの日系人に目を移し、こちらは現地の日本人研究者Kuroda Yasumasa 氏(黒田安昌氏、日本から米国留学し、UCLAで政治学の Ph.D.を修得後、ハワイ大学で教職を得ていた)との連携のもとで、遂行されたのであった。

これを端緒として、今日の一連の「意識の国際比較調査」が世界の各国で遂行されてきたのである。先に述べた「日本人の国民性」調査は機関研究として5年ごとに継続され時系列的拡大を、「意識の国際比較調査」は文部省科学研究費をはじめとする官民の各方面から多大な御援助をいただき空間的拡大を続けている。ハワイに関しては、不定期ではあるが、主として同じ調査項目で幾度か調査が繰り返され、時系列的変化も分析できるようになっている。

今回のハワイ調査はこれまでと同様に、Kuroda 教授の協力を得て、ハワイの住民のほとんどが集中しているホノルル市の住民を対象に 1999 年秋から 2000 年夏まで面接調査を遂行した。(厳密には時代とともに行政区分等の変更により、地理的範囲は微妙に変更されているが、これは本質的なものではないであろう。本報告書中の地図を参照。)

我々の調査研究は、各所で得られた調査データの数字の単純な大小比較を目的とするものではない。同じ調査票、同じ調査方法といっても、各国、各所の事情で言語(翻訳)や標本抽出法等の理論的差異、あるいは名目上は同じでも実践的手続きの詳細な違いによる影響などの問題を見極めながら、統計的、計量的に意味のある比較可能性を追求するところに、我々の「データの科学」としての観点がある。

この意味で、ハワイの調査データの回答数値の分析に入る前に、時代の変化は、まず調査環境の変化も伴っていることに注意しなければならない。これは日本における調査環境でも同様であり、この半世紀に計画サンプルに対する回収率が著しく落ちていて、東京などの大都市部での通常の調査では回収率が 50%を下回るようになってから久しいといわれる。特に、1990年代のハワイ経済の昏迷や調査実施中の日系人ビジネスマンの起こした銃乱射事件の影響などがあり、面接調査の実施状況は困難を極めた。

標本抽出は、ホノルル市から購入した「国政選挙人名簿(CD版)」を利用し、林文(東洋英和女学院大学教授)が遂行した。これには過去2回の国政選挙における投票者の名前が掲載されているが、近年のハワイ経済の昏迷で米国本土へ引っ越しする者が増えたのであろうと推察され、標本抽出された回答者の候補となる人々に面接調査協力の依頼書を調査に先立って郵送したのであるが、かなりの数が宛先知らずで返送されてきたのであった。また、ホノルルの高級住宅街や高級マンションは城壁のように囲まれ、入り口は武装した複数の警備員が常時いて、部外者は簡単に入れないようになっている。このため電話番号が判明しない人々への連絡は、さらに難しいことであった。面接調査に協力してくれた方々の中には、若い女性の面接調査員にこのような面接調査で見知らぬ人に接触していると危険であるから止めるようにと説得する人もいたようである。このように、経済事情、プライバシー保護や社会への不安感などで調査環境は過去のハワイ調査よりも悪く、回収率はかなり低いものとなった。この回収率の低さを考慮して、信頼関係を築きやすいと思われた「日系人のビジネス団体(UJA[United Japanese Association)」に協力を得て、補助的な調査データを収集することも試みたのであった。

調査の詳細な手続きに関しては、黒田氏により、第2章にこれまでの調査研究の背景とともに記されている。調査データの最終的なクリーニングは統計数理研究所で吉野の管理のもとで数週間をかけて行われ、回答カテゴリーの再コード化などがなされたが、この結果は黒田氏の説明の後に記されている。ただし、所属団体、特に宗教団体の区分は、厳密な区分を定義しようとするとかなり難しい問題であることが認識されてきた。宗教学的視点、歴史的視点、あるいは信者自体や一般の人々の意識の観点など、実は多様な視点からの宗教区分が有り得て、それらは常に一致するとは限らない。例えば、日本人調査では、「自分がクリスチャンである」とする回答者が1%程度いるのであるが、欧米の宗教区分ではキリスト教は「カトリック」か、「プロテスタント」であり、「クリスチャン」とするものはない。しかし、日系人調査においても、用意された回答カテゴリーの「カトリック」または「プロテスタント」を選択して、さらに注釈として「クリスチャン」と記す回答者、あるいはカトリックもプロテスタントも選択せず、回答カテゴリー「その他」として「クリスチャン」とする回答もあった。(このあたりの事情は、回答者からの回答を面接調査員がどのように判断して記録していったのか、疑問の残るところである。)

この問題に関しては、研究協力者の Frank Miyamoto 氏(ワシントン大学名誉教授), Tetsuden Kashima 氏(ワシントン大学助教授), Stephen Fugita 氏(サンタ・クラーラ大学教授)に判断を仰いだのであったが、いずれにせよ、複雑な状況に絡んでいるので、拙速な判断は避け、この時点ではなるべく回答のままに近いデータを保持し、将来の個々の分析においては、このデータをどのように区分して判断したかに特に注意すべきものとした。

前述したように、本研究リポートは、1999年度—2001年度の3ヶ年計画の調査研究のうち第2年次の終わりに調査結果の速報を目的としたものであり、詳細な内容の分析や解釈は今後の研究に委ねる。

なお、調査データは近い将来には、個人情報の保護等の問題点を考慮した上で、一般公開し、 広く世界の方々に利用していただくべき作業を推進させているところである。

10. 研究計画の必要性及び期待できる成果

近年、一方で急激な世界秩序の再編成が進みつつあり、他方で各所に民族紛争が勃発し、混乱が続いている。この 国際的潮流は、国家・民族間の円滑な相互理解がまますま す重要なものとなり、世界の政治経済の平和的発展の鍵と なっていることが了解されるであろう。

統計数理研究所では、1953年以来、「日本人の国民性」 調査を遂行してきた。さらにこの研究は、1971年頃より、 国民性をより深い観点から考察する必要性から、国際的比 較調査で拡張され、発展している。この中で、日本人と 海外の各所の「日系人・非日系人の比較調査データ」を収 集し、民族の移動とそれに伴う文化の伝搬、変容のダイナ ミズムを数理・統計科学的に解析し、実証理論的な**基盤を**確立することが、国際的相互理解のためにも、肝要となっている。

本研究では、我々の「日本および世界各国の国民性と文化」に関する統計的調査研究の中心部分となる「ハワイ日系人・非日系人調査」を遂行し、さらに、近い将来に我々の国際比較調査データを一般公開し、国内外の人々が実証的社会調査データを直接利用できるように図る。これが研究者にとっては「国際的共同研究の発展」に結びつき、政治の世界では、「世界の相互理解」と協力へと結びつくことを期待するものである。

11. 研究計画全体の概要

この計画の中心となるのは、「ハワイ日系・非日系人調査」と「国民性の国際比較調査データに関する総合データベースの作成と試験的一般公開・問題点の実践的検討」である。これらは、以下のように進行させる。

1)初年度は、「ハワイ日系・非日系人調査」を遂行する。 日米双方で、既存の資料の検討と再分析を行ったうえで、 調査準備(調査票の確定)、ハワイ日系・非日系人調査実施、データ・クリーニングと調査票のデータ入力、日米独 自の集計分析開始、日米独自の集計分析の中間報告をまとめ、双方、通信にて連絡する。 2)次年度は、「公開研究発表会」と「ハワイ日系・非日系 人調査報告書作成」を行う。

まず、ハワイにおいて、最終分析についての日米合同討議を行う。その後、研究成果を社会的に還元するために、ハワイおよび日本にて研究発表会・現地マスコミ発表を行う。そして、調査報告書を作成する。

3) 最終年度は、「国民性の国際比較調査データに関する総合データベースの作成と試験的一般公開・問題点の実践的 検討」を遂行する。

まず、国際比較調査の観点から文化変容のダイナミズムの統計科学的解明に関する総合報告書作成する。さらに、 国際比較調査データ・ベースを作成し、ホーム・ページ上 での一般公開の試みと問題点の検討を行う。

12. 研究計画の準備状況

これまで、我々の研究グループを中心として、本研究に 直接関係して遂行されてきた国際共同研究は、

等があり、過去の調査データとしての比較の基盤は出来上 がっている。 さらに、今回は、

4)「国民性に関する意識調査データに基づく文化の伝搬変容のダイナミズムの統計科学的解析」文部省科学研究費補助金・基盤研(A)(1998-2000)

による米国西海岸の日系・非日系人の比較調査」が進行中であり、これとの直接的関連で、本研究におけるハワイ調査の調査票の項目の選定・検討、調査環境の検討等、順調に準備が進んでいる。

13. この研究計画に関する内外の状況

最近では、国内外の官民、様々な方面で「国際比較調査」が遂行されるようになってきた。しかし、本研究は、それらの調査の先駆をなしてきた、統計数理研究所を中心とする研究グループの独創であり、「統計科学的調査方法論」に則した国際共同調査研究として他の研究プロジェクトの追従を許していない。主要な成果は国際社会学会、国際社会学機構等を通じて、発表されている。

各国における調査環境の差異を無視した単純な数値データの比較で、根拠の薄い解釈でむしろ誤解を招きかねない研究とは一線を画し、飽くまでも、統計科学的な標本調査理論に即し、さらに、各国の歴史的な差異から生まれた種々の標本抽出の実際的効果の差異を考慮に入れた慎重な分析を進めているのは、世界でも稀な例であろう。

一方で、日本の国際化とともに、日本の文化や国民性に関して、国内外から国際理解のための情報公開が叫ばれている。世界の多くの国々には、社会調査データ・センターがあり、それらの世界的ネットワークが機能しているが、日本には該当する機関はいまだにない。

本研究を含めた一連の「国民性の国際比較研究」を推進させ、これまで得られたデータや情報、その他の成果を世界に広く公開し、日本や日本人の国民性をよりよく理解してもらうことにより、国際的相互理解を通じた日本の世界貢献の一助となることが、国内外の研究者、官民の調査機関等からも強く期待されている。

14. 従来の研究経過・研究成果

この研究課題またはこれに密接に関連した研究課題で、研究代表者及び研究分担者が従来受けた研究費(科学研究費、他省庁・地方公共団体・研究助成法人・民間企業等からの研究費を含む。)の名称(科学研究費については研究種目)、期間(年度)、研究課題名、研究者氏名、研究経費を記入のうえ、それぞれの研究経過・研究成果等について、具体的かつ明確に記入してください。さらに、これらの研究成果を踏まえ、本研究の着想に至った経緯等について、焦点を絞り、具体的かつ明確に記入してください。

統計数理研究所では、1953年以来、40年以上にわたって「日本人の国民性」に関する意識調査を遂行してきた。これは、本研究所の高度の調査技法と統計解析力に支えられ、また文部省や日本全国の大学の教官、研究者諸氏の多大な尽力によって継続してきた。この意味で、従来の狭い学問のセクショナリズムを越えた大規模な学際的グループのネットワークの中で継続されてきた、世界でも希有の研究であり、また収集されてきたデータは世界的にも貴重なものとして認められつつある。この研究は、1971年の「ハワイ日系人調査」を始めとして、国民性をより深い観点から考察する必要性から、国際的共同研究として「国民性の国際比較調査」へと拡張されてきた。既に調査された国・地域のいくつかの対は、言語や文化に共有部分があるために、全体として比較研究の興味深い対象となる。今日では、この調査研究は「文化的連鎖比較の調査研究」(Cultural Link Analysis, CLAと略す)と呼ばれ、発展している。

本研究は、上記の「日本人の国民性」調査研究、さらに「国民性の国際比較」調査研究の一連の流れの中にある。この間、機関研究としてのみならず、多方面からの財政的支援を受けている。以下は、最初の1),2)を除き、比較的近年の主要なもののみを列挙する。

上記の1)により始まり、2)によって継続的調査研究へと発展した一連の研究は、3),4)により「文化的連鎖比較の調査研究」へと昇華し、国際比較調査の方法論が検討され試行された。さらに、5),6)によりこの方法論は確立し、実践的応用へと結びつき、この間の一連の調査研究で得られたデータや分析情報は、国内外の数多くの学会で研究成果を報告され、多数の論文や著作としても出版されてきた。国外の国際的研究者たちも我々の収集したデータに基づいた分析を展開し、各方面で発表している。7)では、これをさらに本格的に完成させるための基礎情報の収集と、一般の研究者への情報公開の準備を進行させる計画である。

これらのCLAのパラダイムに基づく国際比較研究の中核となるのが、「日本人」と海外各所の「日系人・非日系人」の長期にわたる継続調査研究である。これによって、民族の移動とそれに伴う文化の伝幡・推移・変容のプロセスとダイナミズムを数理的・統計科学的に計量的解析し、実証科学としての理論的な基盤を作り上げることが可能となるのである。

具体的には、我々の国際比較調査研究の出発点となった「ハワイ日系人の定期的継続調査」を遂行し、1)日本人と日系人・非日系人との比較、2)日系一世、二世、三世以上の世代間の比較、3)他の諸国との比較、4)継続調査データに基づく時系列的比較等を遂行する事が肝要である。これにより、「文化の変容の統計科学的ダイナミクス」を解明し、より一般に、急速に変化しつつある世界の国々が直面する異文化社会の交流のなかで、将来の世界の平和的発展の重要な情報提供をめざすのである。

15. 年度別の具体的研究内容(箇条書きで連続した年度計画を記入のこと)

(平成11年度)

平成11年度は、アメリカ合衆国側の研究分担者 Y. Kuroda, F. Miyamoto, T. Kashima, S. Fugitaとともに、 「ハワイ日系・非日系人調査実施」が中心となる計画を遂 行する。

4月-7月 日米双方で、それぞれ研究参加者全員で既存の資料の検討と再分析を進める。特に前年度遂行してあるオムニバス調査のデータ分析をしておき、調査項目の選定を進める。

7月 ハワイにて米側研究分担者チームと日本側研究者チーム数名が合流し、調査準備(調査票の確定)をする。

8月 Kuroda, Miyamoto, Kashima, Fugitaの監督のもとで、ハワイ日系・非日系人調査を実施する。

調査対象:18才以上のハワイ在住日系人(1000名)・ハワイ在住非日系白人(600名)

調査法:ハワイの選挙人名簿に基づく無作為抽出法による 標本調査で、訪問面接法により、質問票に基づいた聞き取 り調査を遂行する。(日本の調査代理機関を通じて、米側 の調査機関が遂行する。) 調査項目:過去の「日本人の国民性調査」や「意識の国際

比較調査」を参考にして、「日本人らしさ、米国人らしさ、日系人固有の側面、日米共通の側面」を明らかにするように調査項目を選定する。特に、人間関係(義理人情、中間回答の傾向など)、宗教、信頼感、不安感、家庭、健康、政治、生活満足度、諸々の社会意識、さらにリーダシップに関する項目などを取り上げる予定である。

9月 データ・クリーニングと調査票のデータ入力(調査代理機関)

11月 集計分析開始(研究参加者全員が各々の所属機関にて、データ解析をめる。研究者と研究協力者相互の必要な連絡は、研究代表を通じて行い、これは記録が残るように配慮する。)

3月 集計分析報告をまとめ、双方、研究代表者(吉野) を通じて米側研究協力者とも通信にて情報交換、連絡をする。

(平成12年度)

平成12年度は、前年度の調査結果を集計・分析した成果を、研究代表者(吉野)のもとで報告書としてまとめる作業を、計画の中心とする。

5月 Kurodaを日本へ招聘し、研究代表者とともに分析 結果の予備的検討と今後の方針について研究打ち合わせを 行う。

7-8月 ハワイにおいて、分析結果の日米合同討議 (日本側共同研究者を派遣、米側の共同研究者を招聘)を 行い、最終報告書の焦点についての検討を行う。

ハワイにて公開研究発表会を開催、現地マスコミに成果 を発表する。 9月 日本において公開研究発表会を開催(米側の共同研究者を招聘)、マスコミに成果を発表する研究代表者(吉野)の所属機関を中心に、「ハワイ日系・非日系人調査報告書」を作成開始する。

3月「ハワイ日系・非日系人調査報告書」を完成する。

(平成13年度)

平成13年度は、一方で、これまで統計数理研究所を中心として収集してきた数々の「国民性の国際比較調査データ」をデータ・ベースの形に整え、試験的にコンピュター・ネットワークを通じて一般公開する作業を遂行し、他方で、これまで収集した我々の全ての国際比較調査データを考慮し、文化の伝搬・変容に関する総合報告書を完成させる。

平成12年度は、前年度のハワイ・ホノルル日系・非日系人の調査結果を集計・分析した成果を、 研究代表者(吉野)のもとで報告書としてまとめる作業を中心として、計画を遂行した。特に、8月に はハワイにおいて、分析結果の日米合同討議(日本側共同研究者を派遣、米側の共同研究者を招聘) を行い、報告書の焦点についての検討を行った。

今回の調査では、我々が1971年以降に幾度か遂行してきたハワイ調査とは社会事情がかなり変化し、 調査環境の著しい悪化が見られた。これは、標本抽出に用いた選挙人名簿には、過去2回の国政選挙時 の投票者の名前が掲載されるようになっているが、近年、ハワイの経済状況が悪く、米国本土への移 住者が増えていて、結果として「引越し」が増加し、適正な抽出が困難であったこと、また調査当時 に現地の日系人の起こした殺人事件の影響などのため、安全への不安による「回答拒否」が増加した こと等が考えられる。

今後、調査結果の詳細な分析を推進すべきであるが、世界全体が「伝統的社会システム」から「高 度情報社会」へ移行する過渡期にあるためか、日系人社会においても、様々な側面で伝統的システム の崩壊に伴う「信頼感の低下」の影響が生じているようである。

これらの結果は、研究代表者(吉野)の所属機関を中心に、「ハワイ日系・非日系人調査報告書」を 統計数理研究所リポートとしてまとめ、発刊の準備作業を推進し、近く完了する予定である。

Chapter 1 Honolulu Survey 2000 and Its Objectives

1.1 Backdrop of Honolulu Survey

Mathematics, wondered who Japanese are as Japan regained its independence status following the signing of Peace Treaty in San Francisco in 1951. He gathered data on the characterization of what constituted Japanese people 「日本国民性の研究」 [A Study of Japanese National Character] long before the advent of 日本人論」 [Theory of Japanese People] in the 1970s. From this body of the literature, he developed a questionnaire designed to the tap the essence of Japanese culture. He used a random sampling of 3,000 or more Japanese adults to conducted a nation-wide survey every five years since 1953.

As the decade of 1970s began, Dr. Hayashi and his colleagues wondered again what happens to Japanese values or Japanese-ness once the Japanese emigrate abroad. Japan by that time acquired enough trade surplus generated as a result of the Vietnam War among other events to allow scholars to conduct research abroad. In 1971, Yasumasa Kuroda at the University of Hawaii joined Hayashi's team to begin the study of Japanese Americans in Honolulu. We conducted our first random sample survey of Japanese Americans living in urban Honolulu based upon the list of registered voters (Suzuki, 1972, The Research Committee on the Study of Honolulu Residents, 1980, 1984, 1986, 1990). Since then, we realized that Japanese Americans do not live alone in the island. They live among other ethnics in Honolulu where there is no ethnic group that constitutes a majority. The Japanese Americans constitute a plurality among ethnic groups in Hawaii as a whole and in Honolulu as well. They continue to account for more than one-third of the voters in Honolulu followed by Caucasians with about one-third of the population. The courageous and wise young generation of the 1940s and 1950s largely under the leadership of Hawaii's Democratic Party especially after 1954 brought about the beginning to the end of segregated housing along other forms of ethnic/racial discrimination in Hawaii. Although certain forms of discrimination continue to exist, much of discriminatory practices were eliminated by the 1980s.² Japanese Americans experienced difficulties in finding their homes in desirable places as late as the 1970s.

Chain-Link Approach

Chikio Hayashi developed a chain-link approach or theoretical framework to study various countries. He calls it 「連鎖的国際比較調查方法」. His approach, for example, is that Japanese Americans maintain some values they share with Japanese while they also have American values the Japanese do not have and values they have in common with other local ethnic groups that make the rest of Hawaii's population. Japanese Americans constitute a link to Americans as a whole who in turns relates to Europeans.

His chain-link continued to expand its territories covered beyond Hawaii. We conducted Hawaii surveys in 1972, 1978, 1983, 1988 and 2000. He and his teams conducted surveys in U.S. mainland (1988), France (1987), Italy (1987), Germany (1987) and England (1987) as well as Japanese Brazilians. They also collected some data in China, the Philippines and other parts of the world as well. In earlier surveys in Hawaii, we used to have a Japanese version of

the questionnaire administered among some Japanese Americans who preferred Japanese to English. We discontinued this option after a couple of surveys, but Hayashi observed that the traditional translation of the questionnaire did not seem to elicit equivalent responses from our respondents.³ In other words, the questionnaire may be translated in a valid and reliable fashion, but that did not constitute a sufficient condition to assume that responses we receive from respondents will be functionally equivalent and reliable. His team initiated bilingual surveys to measure the validity and reliability of translation among Tsukuba University students and foreigners staying in Tokyo.

The Theory of Rashomonesque Yamazakura 羅生門·山桜論

Subsequently, Yasumasa Kuroda of the University of Hawaii and Tatsuzō Suzuki of the Institute of Statistical Mathematics in Tokyo received a couple of grants from the Toyota Foundation to conducted bilingual surveys of Arabic, English and Japanese in the United States, Egypt and Jordan.⁴ He and his team conducted a follow-up study of Arabic and English languages through bilingual focused-interviews in Amman and Cairo. The most important finding from these studies is that whenever there is a neutral or middle-response category in a questionnaire Japanese language users are most likely to select the middle-response category while Arabic language users are least likely to do so. English speakers are found between the two extremes but definitely closer to Arabic than to Japanese. Nationality played less significant roles than language in use. Language structures our observational sense as well as our responses at least as far as this dimension is concerned.⁵ Arabic and American language speakers feel no resistance in choosing between two alternative such as yes and no. Japanese language speakers' proclivity is not to choose but to adjust to a particular situation, which minimizes conflicts with others. From the cross-language surveys and others, Havashi and Kuroda (1997) developed a theory of Rashomonesque Yamazakura⁶ consisting of two key elements in Japanese culture; diffuse concept of self and multiple (relativistic) view of the reality. Their theory assumes that language and religion constitutes the basic foundation of a culture, shaping the way we respond to a situation. They found their longitudinal survey data as well as qualitative historical data such as poems from the 7th century on support the theory of Rashomonesque Yamazakura.

Self, Others, Interpersonal Relationship, Organization and Adjustment

In 1988, S. Frank Miyamoto of the University of Washington, Stephen Fugita of Santa Clara University of California and Tetsuden Kashima of the University of Washington joined Hayashi's team to study Japanese Americans in the West Coast. Miyamoto proposed. They brought their theoretical concerns to be incorporated into their surveys in the West Coast. Miyamoto's longstanding theoretical focus originating in the 1930s of strong organizational and interpersonal relationship in predominantly the Issei-community was one. In addition, his more recent work on the Nisei's interpersonal style characterized by sensitivity to others in the tradition of George Herbert Mead was incorporated to our questionnaire in Hawaii. Kashima brought (Kashima 1977) his concern for how Buddhists modified their organizations to meet the needs of Japanese American community in the West Coast. Fugita too is interested in Japanese American organizations that continue to thrive despite their successful assimilation

into the mainstream of American life. Their largely sociological and social psychological concerns were added to the growing list of items to be included in our survey of 2000.

We wish to note that the theory of *Rashomonesque Yamazakura* focused on the concept of self while the West Coast concerns added another dimension that focuses more on self and others. There are similarities in our theoretical concerns. The Japanese self characterized by its diffuse features means that Japanese are sensitive to others and others' views of them. Hence, group becomes most salient unit in Japanese society. Kashima's findings of changing nature of Buddhist organizations and Fugita's discovery of the success of Japanese Americans' assimilation in America all also represent what we say is an integral part of being a Japanese who tends to face a situation with an adjustment in mind, not a choosing between alternatives.

We attributed the nature of Japanese culture to language and religion, while the three West Coast sociologists seem to imply that Japanese Americans' tendency to maintain persistent and strong ethnic organizations are derived from their immigrant backgrounds in Japan. In a way, what they propose is that even if the Japanese language is lost among younger generations of Japanese Americans, they will remain Japanese Americans and that this trend may be reinforced by their ethnic organizational membership.

1.2 Objectives

It is within these conceptual and theoretical concerns within which the original question of what makes up a Japanese mind or culture is continued to be studied through our longitudinal and comparative surveys in a chain-link fashion. Our surveys have covered all three continents since its inception in 1953 to 2000. We continued to expand our search for the original question of what is meant to be Japanese to include how they are similar to and different from their emigrant siblings and their posterities to others in American and African continents and in Europe. This survey report may mark the beginning of an end of our search for our questions as far as our generation of researchers are concerned.

What constitutes the nature of Japanese American culture, so-called the "local culture," and multi-ethnic culture of Hawaii at large? How are all these groups different from and similar to others we have surveyed in the past? To what extent and in what direction are they changing when compared longitudinally with our past data? How are Honolulu's Japanese Americans similar to and different from their counterparts in the West Coast? How are they different from the Japanese in Japan? Are Honolulu's Japanese Americans closer to the Japanese in Japan than those of the West Coast? It is these questions and other related-questions that we have attempted to answer in this report.

1.3 Research Site and the Universe

The city and county of Honolulu covers the entire island of Oahu, most populated island of all Hawaiian islands. Oahu's population accounts for three-fourths of the total State population of 1.1or 2(?) million people. Approximately one-half of the population lives in the area of Honolulu we designated as the area for the universe of our inquiry, Kokohead in the east to Diamond Head side of Middle Street in the west. It is most urbanized part of the island. We find East Honolulu to be largely represented by well-to-do families of Caucasian, Chinese and Japanese origins and by less-well-to-do indigenous Hawaiians, Filipinos and other more

recent immigrants and their posterities in the west. The universe includes registered voters of both very rich and poor in addition to the middle class, but does not include rural voters.

Secured condominiums were rare when we first started our surveys in 1972. We observed the advent of gated-communities staffed by security guard in the 1980s. The number of them has increased with time. In the 1990s, we saw the rise of the use of cellular phones, caller identification, unlisted telephone subscribers and fast-food restaurants. Young people no longer eat dinner at home, making it very difficult to get hold of them to secure an interviewing. The recession in the 1990s in Hawaii proved to be severe blow to Hawaii economy, resulting in the drastic cut in the State spending and the rise of unemployment while the mainland enjoyed its unprecedented prosperity. For example, the State cut the University of Hawaii's budget by one-third of the budget in the early 1990s. Many moved to the mainland to seek a better economic opportunity. It was not until the summer of 2000 when signs of economy recovery started to appear. What do these mean to the 2000 survey?

We first used the list of registered voters to define the universe of our survey and continued to do so this time as well. One problem has been that we used Representative District to define the population at the outset. Unfortunately, boundaries of the Districts do not remain the same over the years due to periodic reapportionments. We wanted to maintain the same area to be covered in our population, resulting in defining the population to be all registered voters who reside in areas from Koko Head in the east and Diamond or East side of Middle Street in the west.

1.4 Sampling

We purchased a CD containing a list of registered voters of the State of Hawaii (N=431,428). We sent the copy to Fumi Hayashi of our research team at the Toyo Eiwa University. Hayashi was in charge of sampling and sent us back a list of sample respondents on a diskette. She selected 2,101 sample respondents out of 178,428 registered voters in the universe (Representative District 15-30) by using systematic random sampling.

We also developed another sample of about 3,000 respondents for possible uses if we could not get about 500 respondents out of the original sample. We ended up using this sample list as well as we succeeded in getting only 449 valid responds out of 2,101 possible sample respondents. In consultation with Tokyo, we decided to select only voters with recognizable Japanese names. We recognized and selected 215 Japanese names out of the first 692 names that appeared in the list. We secured 51 interviews out of 215 possible sample respondents. In the survey of Japanese Americans, Yasumasa Kuroda conducted for the US Department of Health and Welfare in 1985, he found approximately 16 percent of the Japanese Americans had names that are not recognizable to be Japanese origin in Honolulu. It is safe to assume we missed nearly 20 percent of the Japanese Americans in the process. We should also report that we found five who turned out to be non-Japanese among 51 respondents we succeeded in interviewing. We discovered one Filipino, one Hawaiian and three Caucasians. The last to be interviewed was a Caucasian woman physician married to a Japanese who kept postponing her interview due to emergencies for several times before our interviewer secured an interview with this busy physician. We decided to over-sample Japanese Americans in order for us to have a sufficient number of Japanese Americans with whom to compare Japanese Americans on the West Coast.

1.5 Interviewing

We followed the same method of conducing the survey as we have done in the past.

- 1. Letter of Introduction: Yasumasa Kuroda using his University stationary wrote a letter of introduction and request for an interview to respondents. A copy of the letter is attached in the Appendix 1-A. The contents of his letter varied somewhat from the beginning to the end with little variation. It essentially introduces what the survey is all about and how important it is for us to seek the cooperation of all potential respondents. Kuroda left his office telephone number and e-mail address for any response respondents may wish to make. He did receive calls as well as e-mail messages, largely to ask that their names be deleted. But there are some who kindly let us him know that they moved or give telephone number to call etc. One busy physician sent him a message to keep his interviewer try again to contact the physician's office. This is the first survey where e-mail messages are exchanged with potential respondents. He mailed a limited number of letters once a week or so to make sure that not too many days elapses between the time respondents receive their letter and the time of our interviewers to contact them.
- 2. Interviewers Hired and Trained: We hired and trained more than two-dozen interviewers but only about a half of them turned out to our interviewers in the sense that they produced any results. Most of those who worked for at least a few months did well. We verified each survey completed through either calling or checking on respondent's year of birth. We had information on the date of birth for most of the respondents from the list of registered voters. One of them returned only one completed survey, which we had to discard. Another one did only three completed interviews. Most of them quit before they start. An instruction for interviewers is attached in the Appendix 1-B.
- 3. Interviewing: We instructed our interviewers to practice interviewing with their friends or family members until they felt they are comfortable. Whenever possible, they made phone calls in advance to make an appointment. Valid phone numbers are available only a few times out of ten potential respondents. We instructed interviewers to make at least three attempts to locate their respondents. We told them to make three attempts at different times and different day of the week preferably in late afternoon and early evening and weekends. After two attempts, we instructed them to leave a message to call them back. And if they think they can get cooperation of any respondent who was not home three times. We encourage them to visit any number of times until they can get the respondent.

One of our interviewers who is dressed in aloha shirt and slacks, had inquired about whereabouts of a respondent's house in a low-income neighborhood. Several people standing on sidewalk told him: "You don't want to see him." Our interviewer responded by asking why not. They told him. "He is a drug dealer." We did not send any woman interviewers to low-income districts. Even men interviewers were not too happy with going to certain neighborhood. One of them simply refused to go there after visiting the area once. We found one Filipino American interviewer who turns out to be effective in securing mostly Filipino and other local respondents, but he did not have much time for interviewing. He even informed us that he was scared to go after dark.

Fortunately we completed the entire survey without any incident or serious accident. We did experience one interviewer being bitten by a dog in the 1988 survey. We always had to balance our interest of maximizing the percentage of successfully completing the

interview and safety of the interviewers. We did carry liability, workman comp and other insurance to protect the interviewers.

Verification: Our interviewers turned-in their completed questionnaire once a week. We then verified through either telephoning or checking the year of birth between what we find in the completed survey and the data contained in the voter list. We had a few cases of interviewing wrong people. One case involved father and son who had the same name but different middle initials. We are happy to report that the result of verification produced no falsified surveys at all. We did not just verify a sample of the respondents but we verified every single survey completed.

5. Success Rate for Completed Surveys:

Despite our interviewers' efforts to secure as many interviews as possible from a limited number of potential respondents, we found our efforts fell short of our expectation of securing 500 surveys out of 2101 potential respondents. This is the lowest ever rate of success. We used a supplemental sample list of Japanese Americans to complete 500 surveys.

There are several reasons for the low rate of success. First, a recent court ruling changed the interpretation of election law, making it impossible to delete names from the list of registered voters for those who did not vote in two consecutive time as done in the past. Now. a voter must fail to vote over two election years, which could amounts to four years. One father wrote me a letter stating that his daughter died several years ago and he reported her death to the City Clerks office. Despite his request to remove his daughter's name from the list, he keeps getting election notices from the State.

Second, Hawaii's economy suffered from a lengthy recession in the 1990s, prompting a number of residents to leave the island for a better economic opportunity in the mainland.

Third, an increased number of gated communities and secured condominium hampered our interviewers from making the initial contact.

Fourth, a decreasing number of telephone numbers are published and more people use cellular telephones than ever before.

Fifth, the largest murderer case in Hawaii involving a Japanese American employee at the local Xerox and other violent crimes occurring during the duration of survey did not help us at all in securing cooperation of some respondents. People are cautious in opening the door to strangers when our interviewers call on them. One of our female interviewers told me that an elderly Japanese American lady in Kaimuki pleaded our young and attractive Caucasian interviewer to stop being an interviewer. She told her it is too dangerous for young and pretty women like her to be going from house to house.

We found we succeeded in securing 449 interviews while 279 potential respondents (\$12) refused to take part in the survey after being contacted. We secured 52 interviews out of the 52 > 51 second sample consisting of 215 potential respondents. What follows is a breakdown of the results of our efforts to interview 2,101 potential respondents. Figures appearing following the first set of figures represent the result of the second sampling of Japanese Americans.

- **Pau** (Completed): 449 (21%), 51 (24%) We interviewed 449 out of the original sample of 2,101 potential respondents.
- **Refused**: 279 (13%), 34 (16%)

This category includes those who gave indirect answers such as "I am not interested."

• *Moved*: 550 (26%), 25 (12%)

Yasumasa Kuroda has written all potential respondents a letter informing them of the survey under way and that they will be contacted. Approximately 550 letters came back, for those respondents no longer reside where they had when they last voted. He realizes some of his letters did not come back for such reasons as new residents of the same apartments or houses may have simply discarded his letters.

• *Not home*: 425 (20%), 62 (29%)

We instructed our interviewers to make at least three efforts to contact every potential respondent at different times and days, and they did in most cases. We know that in some cases, our interviewers made more than a dozen contacts when they believed they had a chance to make contact, with potential respondents such as attorneys and physicians who told them to try. In some cases, they succeeded, but not always.

A constraint here is that we had to instruct our interviewers to locate potential respondents during the day, never to knock on their doors after dark. Our interviewers only had a couple of hours, between roughly 5 and 9 p.m., to locate these individuals. We sent only local male interviewers to areas considered dangerous. In some parts of the city, even our local interviewers did not feel secure and were stared at by residents on the street.

On one occasion, our interviewer was advised "You don't want see him." Our interviewer asked "Why not?" Their reply was that he is a drug dealer. Apparently they did not think our neatly dressed man in an Aloha shirt was his customer.

• Not home/Left Message: 155 (7%), 14 (6%)

This category includes two types of cases. The first is a situation where a respondent's family member is presented, but not the respondent. The second is a situation where our interviewer visited a respondent's home more than once and felt secure enough to leave a message with his or her contact telephone number.

• Contact later: 32 (2%), 9 (4%)

There are some people who specify when they may become available because they may be involved in some work or going on a trip or whatever. We tried to contact these people a couple of months later, for example, to secure an interview. In some cases, we were successful, but not always. Also, it includes those respondents who cancelled their appointments or did not show up for an interview after making an appointment.

• No English: 31 (2%), 1 (0%)

There were some respondents whose English was not sufficiently proficient to answer our questions. All of them were Asian immigrants of one country or another.

• *Ill/in hospital*: 24 (1%), 5 (2%)

Some respondents suffer from chronic illness or were in a hospital, not available for an interview. If the nature of illness was temporary, our interviewers went back for an interview after recovery.

• *Physical*: 7 (0%), 4 (2%)

These are mostly physically challenged people who could not be interviewed. In one case, an authority that a potential respondent was in custody informed me.

• **Deceased**: 19 (1%) 0 (0%)

We found 19 out of 2101 sample respondents deceased. Some of their family members contacted us upon the receipt of my letter to inform me of the death of their family member. In some cases, our interviewers found out by visiting their residence.

• No access: 68 (3%), 9 (4%)

An increasing number of condos are not accessible to outsiders. Also, there have been recent developments of gated communities where no outsiders can enter unless one is invited. We instructed our interviewers not to go into a condo by following other people into the building.

• Can't locate: 44 (2%), 1 (0%)

This category includes those who may have moved out and whose residence has been demolished. In most cases, these are residents of dilapidated buildings that have been demolished.

• Out-of-town: 14 (1%), 1 (0%)

We found some young people who were on the mainland attending college while others were gone for an extended period of time. These do not include those who are on vacation or business trip.

• West of Middle Street: 4 (0%), 0 (0%)

We found at least four of the potential respondents were located outside of the designated sampling area.

• *Total* N = 2101, N = 215

These figures indicate that Japanese Americans move less often and constitute more stable than other ethnics. They tend to stay home less often when our interviewers attempt to make contact. However, their rate of cooperation as well as refusal is not significantly different from that of the public at large.

We added an extra set of questions for Japanese Americans to respond as evidenced in the Appendix 1-C.

1.6 The Questionnaire

It is from theoretical concerns described in Chapter 1 that went into the construction of our questionnaire for Hawaii survey 2000. In addition to Japanese national character study items we took from the following sources: CREDOC [Centre de Rescherche pour l'etude et L'observation des Conditions de vie] in Paris, NORC [National Opinion Research Center] distributed by the Roper Public Opinion Research Center, items we developed for the Honolulu survey and items generated by Frank Miyamoto, Tetsuden Kashima and Stephen Fugita for the West Coast survey. A copy of the questionnaire is attached in the Appendix 1-D.

We exchanged e-mail messages, faxes and telephone calls to develop our questionnaire in the summer of 1999 with our team members on the West Coast and Tokyo. As with the case in the past surveys, we always have more questions we wish to include than we have space for them. We had to limit the length of our questionnaire to a reasonable length in order to maintain the validity of responses we receive from our respondents. It takes about 35 to 40 minutes to complete the questionnaire for most people. There were cases where it took close to three hours to complete the survey.

1.7 The Coding and Data Cleaning

We made a few decisions on coding.

First, we decided to take the first of two responses whenever a respondent gave two answers to a question. We have instructed our interviewers to ask for one answer for each question unless otherwise so instructed (e.g., Q45). Despite our efforts to the contrary, some respondents insisted on giving us two answers and some interviewers allowed two responses. However, we found no more than a dozen of such nature.

Second, we instructed our interviewers to simply record the answer to the question of one's main occupation (Q72), rather than for them to interpret and categorize respondents into one of the given categories. Despite our efforts, some interviewers kept classifying respondents into categories without specifying the nature of the main occupation. We have decided to change some of my interviewers' classifications whenever we felt the classification was inappropriate. For example, a high school graduate is unlikely to be a professional (attorney, architect, scientist, engineer, professor, teacher, etc.) even when our interviewer classified him to be such. we reclassified him to the position of clerk instead of professional. Consequently, there are some discrepancies between what is in some of the completed questionnaire and the data. These discrepancies are intentional rather than errors.

Third, a question occurred to me as we started to see one organization in questions 80-92 classified as one organization type such the United Japanese Society being classified as a cultural organization and sometimes that of a community. We thought of unifying the classification system, however, We found that it is an impossible task since there are organizations with which we are not familiar. We decided to allow respondents to decide and interviewers to record whatever respondents said.

We completed the initial coding and data entry in Honolulu. In August of 2000 Kuroda sent the data as an attachment to his e-mail message to Fumi Hayashi. Ryōzō Yoshino and his research team members at the Institute took the completed questionnaire to Tokyo with them on their way home from the Honolulu Conference held at the end of August of 2000.

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¹ One should not confuse the census population figures with those of the registered voters since former include any resident who happen to be living in the island at the time of census regardless of citizenship or voter registration. Because of a relatively large number of military personnel and their family members in the island and the fact that Hawaii has one of the highest income tax rates, many residents are not registered vote in Hawaii.

² Japanese American faculty members including Yasumasa Kuroda along with other locals were found to be about 8 percent below the average salary of Caucasian colleagues of comparable positions in 1995. Women faculty turned to be below 3 percent of men of comparable positions. The University administration made efforts to adjust this inequity but not to the satisfaction of all parties in view of serious financial constraints suffered by the State of Hawaii.

³ The traditional method is to translated the original questionnaire into a second language and have someone other than the one who translated the original questionnaire translates the second language version back into the original language. If the two versions of the questionnaire in the original language more or less are the same, we considered the translation valid.

⁴ Yasumasa Kuroda's reasoning for including Arabic was that we are concerned with written language. Ancient Greeks from whom stem modern world civilization including English language obtained their written language and the concept of money from Syro-palestinians. Kuroda felt that he could do more meaningful comparison of the data if he had three different languages than two.

⁵ On this finding and other related findings, see Hayashi and Kuroda (1987) and the references therein.

⁶ Rashomon in this instance is derived from Akira Kurosawa's movie that won the first Japanese movie to win Cannu Movie Festival award in 1951. Kurosawa's theme is that there may be no single absolute truth or reality, but rather the world is relativistic in the Sophist tradition of "Man is the measure of all things."

⁷ We found the need for verification necessary after discovering some falsified surveys. It takes a lot of time and efforts to verify by phone and mail. Fortunately, when we use the list of registered voters, we can also obtain their date of birth, which helps us verify. A limited number of phone calls to check on each interviewer are necessary to find out how well she or he performs as an interviewer. In so doing, not just whether or not she or he went to interview but also how long she or he took complete an interview. We have had cases in the past where an interviewer asked only a few questions and filled out the rest of questionnaire on his own. This is similar to what the Japanese calls "kiseru."

サンプルリスト1で調査を進めたところ、回収率が非常に悪いことが予想されたため、 日系人の回答者数を追加するため、日系人のみのサンプルリストを、次のように作成した。 サンプルリスト1と同様に(6)の等間隔抽出で、初期値を変えて抽出した 2101 人の中から、 最初の 692 人のうち、名前から日系人と推察される人だけを抜き出し、215 人のリストを作成 した。

これを「サンプルリスト2」とする。

このサンプルは、サンプルリスト1の調査の回収に努力し、これ以上は回収の望めないという段階で、日系人回答者の数が少ない場合に、最後の手段として用いることとした。(実際、サンプルリスト1の回収数が449で止まってしまった段階で、サンプルリスト2を使用した。)

3. 回収状況

1971年調査から1988年調査までの回収状況は表1の通りである。1978年、1983年調査では、日系・非日系合わせた回収率は60%程度(日系のみの回収率の方が高い)であったが、1988年調査では43%に低下している。さらに今回の1999年調査では、調査環境だけでなく社会の状況も悪化していることが指摘され、名簿の悪さも加わり、回収率は良くなかった。日系人については、別に名前から日系人と判断された215人のサンプルについても調査した。その中でも回収率は同程度である。




ハワイ日系人(2000年調査)とハワイ日系人(1988年調査)




ハワイ日系人とアメリカ西海岸日系人




ハワイ日系人と日系人以外




ハワイ日系人とアメリカ本土生まれの白人

第6章 日系人と非日系人の性別・年齢別の単純集計表(項目毎)

1. 質問番号、質問文、回答肢は実際の調査で使われた調査票を、そのまま表示した。ただし、質問文の改行などは変えた。原則として1頁に1質問項目、日系人のみを対象とした質問Jxxは1頁に2質問項目を入れた。

各質問番号の前に、「7カ国国際比較調査」との共通質問については#番号を、1988年の「ハワイ調査」との共通質問はそこでの質問番号を $H \times \times$ として、1999年の「アメリカ西海岸の日系人調査」との共通質問はそこでの質問番号を $W \times \times$ として記した。

- 2. 表中の数字は、各表側に該当する回答者数に対する比率である。パーセント表示で小数点以下 2 桁目を四捨五入してある。該当者が全くないセルは、'0.0' の代わりに '-' と記した。
- 3. クロス表の表頭の数字は、原則として調査票上の回答肢の番号通りであるが、コーディングし直したものについては、追加コード、修正コードなどとして、それぞれの個所に特記した。「その他」「D.K.」については、調査票に記されているコードについては、回答者が全くない場合も記した。
- 4. クロス表の表側は、

日系人について、全体(JA)、性別(Male, Female)、20 歳刻みの年齢別(20-39, 40-59, 60-)、 日系人以外のハワイ住民(Ethnicity の詳細については、質問 74 を参照のこと) について、 全体(Others)、性別(Male, Female)、年齢別(20-39, 40-59, 60-)、および、アメリカ本土 生まれの白人(Caucasian(Mainland))、

日系人とそれ以外を含めたハワイホノルル住民(Honolulu residents)(選挙人登録者、サンプルリスト1のみ)

右端の整数はそれぞれに該当する回答者数である。

注)日系人の定義は、"Ethnic Identity"ではなく、調査員と本人の了解により、日系人用の調査を受けた人とする。ほとんどが「日系人」であるが、質問 74 (Ethnicity) への回答は、「Japanese」196人(206人中)、「Mixed」8人、「その他」1人、「沖縄」1人である。日系人、それ以外のそれぞれは、サンプルリスト1とサンプルリスト2、両方のサンプルからの回答集計である。

日系人とそれ以外を含めたホノルル住民(Honolulu residents)は、サンプルリスト1のサンプルのみの集計である。回答者 449 人(回収率 21.4%)、そのうち日系人は 35.6%である。サンプルリスト1は、サンプリング台帳から等間隔抽出されているので、回収率の問題を除けば、偏りのない回答者集団となっている。サンプルリスト2は、同様の別サンプルから、名前で日系人と推測される対象者のみを抽出して作成したため、ほとんど(46/51)が日系である。このため、両方を加えるのは統計的には適当でない。

サンプルリスト1,2についての詳細は、「3.サンプリングと回収状況」の項参照。

5. 質問80から93の所属団体を尋ねた質問については、単純な集計だけでは、深い意味をなさないので、ここでは集計を掲載しないこととした。



Interviewing Manual

This is designed to acquaint you with the nature of our study and the interviewing tasks you are about to assume. The objective is to help you become a successful interviewer. For this purpose, we first introduce you to the 1999-2000 Honolulu Survey, including steps involved in completing the interviewing process, followed by interviewing rules you are requested to observe.

The 1999-2000 Honolulu Survey

The survey represents the fifth in a series of sample surveys we conducted in Honolulu since we initiated the first survey in 1971. The objective of the study is to generate theories that explain cultural dynamics in comparative perspective. The study is derived from the study of Japanese culture by Dr. Chikio Hayashi, former Director General of the Institute of Statistical Mathematics in Tokyo in 1953 following Japan's independence. He and his colleagues have conducted a longitudinal survey of about 5,000 randomly selected Japanese adults every five year since then. We have published a number of articles, monographs and books on the subject. Several monographs on Honoluluans have been distributed through the University of Hawaii Press. The latest book, entitled Japanese Culture in Comparative Perspective, was co-authored by Hayashi and Kuroda and published by Praeger in 1997.

The impetus for the 1971 survey of Honoluluans came from Dr. Hayashi's desire to know how Japanese emigrants and their descendants change their values and attitudes by living in Honolulu. Our objective is to interview a cross-section of voters in the urban sector of Honolulu who reside between Koko Head in the east and the Diamond head side of Middle Street (odd numbered street address) to the west. Our population is defined as those who are registered to vote in the area, which is not the way a population is defined by the Census Bureau. The number of randomly selected sample respondents will be 600-700.

The Honolulu Survey is directed by Dr. Kuroda, a professor of political science at the University of Hawaii. Funding for the project is provided by the Institute of Statistical Mathematics in Tokyo.

It shares its office with M Hirata Design Media, located at the following address: 1488 South King Street, Suite 209, Honolulu, Hawaii 96814. The Institute of Statistical Mathematics provides funding for the survey.

The Survey Process

First, the Project Director writes a letter requesting the respondent's cooperation in taking part in the survey. The letter describes how a respondent is chosen and the nature of the survey. He mails letters out at least 5 days before you make the first call to potential respondents for an appointment.

Second, you call your respondent to make an appointment to visit the respondent's home or to meet with at a place of the respondent's choice such as a coffee shop or shopping center.

Third, you interview the respondent as scheduled.

Fourth, you turn in completed questionnaires on Monday afternoons to the office.

Fifth, after you return the completed questionnaires, they will be verified by the office by phone or mail. Verified questionnaires will be entered into a data file without respondent names and processed for data analysis.

Interviewing Instruction

- 1. The first objective is to establish a good rapport with your respondent at the initial contact when you make a call to make an appointment to secure the commitment for an interview. The first one minute is crucial to your success.
- 2. The second objective is to absorb what respondents have to say to the questions we ask and complete the questionnaire promptly. The faster you go through the questionnaire, the more likely the respondent will reveal her or his real feelings and thoughts, which is what we seek.
- 3. You will given a list of respondents to interview. You are asked to call to make an appointment to meet in person at a mutually acceptable time and place. First, you identify yourself and ask for the prospective respondent. If the sample respondent is not at home, please make sure you speak with the person on your sampling list. If the person is not at home, ask for the best time to call back. The first impression you give the prospective respondent will decide whether or not s/he participates in the survey. Be positive and ask when would be the best time to meet, not if you can interview the person. Most people prefer to be interviewed at the place of residence, but there are people who would rather meet in public places such as coffee shops or their offices.
 - Make sure you do not endanger yourself by making an appointment to meet in the middle of the night or at an isolated place.
- 4. Make sure you keep your appointment. If you cannot keep it for whatever reason, please make another appointment ahead of time or call the office to see if someone else can interview that person.
- 5. Before you go, you should have all your necessary items: a map, pens, questionnaires, and a flashlight. To minimize or reduce differences among the interviewers in order to receive comparable answers from all respondents, you are requested to dress comfortably, but not too casually. We would like men to wear a shirt and slacks and women to wear comparable attire. No shorts please. We would like you to look like a professional interviewer and act like one. The point here is that you need to be neutral in order for us to receive responses that are comparable with all respondents. For example, if you wear a T shirt with some political slogan, your respondent's responses are going to be colored in one way or another. The ways we respond to questions vary by who asks them. We wish to minimize that.
- 6. Be prompt and if a respondent is not at home or at the place of appointment, wait for 20 minutes before you leave. You should also so inform the respondent when you make your appointment. You should make efforts at the earliest possible time to make another appointment. If you find your respondent, first thank the respondent for taking time for you. Then, introduce yourself and briefly explain the nature of survey without going into detail.
- 7. If you are offered coffee or any drinks or food, please decline. If you wish to accept the offer, please do so after the interviewing is completed. The reason is to avoid any accidental spilling of coffee or a drink on expensive white carpet. You should concentrate on your interviewing.
- 8. After the interviewing is completed, express your appreciation for the respondent's cooperation. Ask if the respondent is interested in receiving a summary report next year when the preliminary data analysis is completed. Ask for the respondent's telephone number that can be used for the Director to personally thank the person and verify the interview. If a person declines to give you a telephone number, please make sure you have the correct address and inform the person that the Director will be contacting the person through mail.

9. Turn in your completed questionnaires to the office on Mondays (3-5 PM). Your pay will be based on the number of completed and verified interviews. We consider the falsification of one or more of interviews to be sufficient grounds for immediate dismissal and for forfeiture of pay for the falsified questionnaire.

How to deal with refusal attempts

- "Not interested." Many people in the past surveys found many of our questions interesting since we started our survey in 1971. It's very important that we get everyone's opinions in the sample. Otherwise, the results won't be representative of all people in Honolulu. If you don't want to answer some questions in the survey, that's OK. So, I would very much appreciate if I can have a chance to talk with you.
- "Too busy." Sorry to have caught you at a bad time. I would be happy to call you back. When would be a good time to call you back?
- "Bad health." I'm sorry to hear that I would be happy to call back in a day or two. Would that be OK?
- "Too old. Don't know enough." We seek everyone's opinions. For many questions, there are no right or wrong answers. It depends on what you think. We are not interested in what you know but rather how you feel about certain things in life. Some people we have interviewed have expressed the same concerns you have. But once we got through the first few questions, they didn't have any trouble answering our questions. We just want your opinion.
- "No one's business." I understand. That's why our interviews are confidential and anonymous. We protect your privacy and we do not enter your name into our data set. We have received no complaints along this line since started carrying out our surveys 28 years ago.

If you do not wish to answer any questions in the survey, you may skip them and move on.

Interviewing Techniques

- 1. Preparation: Read the questionnaire and become thoroughly familiar with the questionnaire.
- 2. Proper interviewing attitudes: Healthy and professional interviewing attitudes include: being friendly but not over friendly, casual, neutral and impartial, confident, and positive.
- 3. Don't do any of the following:
 - 3.1 Get involved in lengthy instruction or explanation. Be parsimonious and courteous.
 - 3.2 Explain questionable wording. You do not know why questions are worded the way they are.
 - 3.3 Educate the public. Never explain the meaning of any word or suggest an example or an answer. The respondent is expected to interpret a question in her or his way. If s/he does not understand any word or question, ascertain that and make a check on the NA/DK column. Your mission is to absorb information from the public. Never show any approval or disapproval of an answer.
 - 3.4 Add, subtract or otherwise change wording in the questionnaire. You are expected to read each question exactly as written in the sequence as it appears. The last response category, "NA/DK" is the only exception. It should not be read or offered.

- 3.5 Change an answer to a question. We are only interested in the first answer a respondent gives. You may record the second answer on the margin but never change any answer once it is given. We are interested in first impressions only and not in second thoughts.
- 3.6 Let the people other than a respondent sit in on the interview. Isolate your respondent the best way you can without alienating family members. In a friendly yet firm manner, request family members not to interrupt your interview. We are interested in our respondent's views and not anyone else's. We do not wish to have our respondent's answer contaminated by those around the respondent.
- 3.7 Talk about what some respondents said to persons other than the Director. The information you obtain is confidential.
- 3.8 Interview someone you know. Turn that person's name and address to the Director for another interviewer to interview her/him.
- 3.9 Falsify or otherwise deviate from the established interviewing procedure. All responses are carefully examined and verified. Anyone who is found to have falsified a questionnaire will be asked to immediately terminate her/his employment. If a wrong person is interviewed by mistake, you will be asked to interview the right respondent. It is not worth the trouble to do the job wrong.

4. Do the following:

- 4.1 Be polite.
- 4.2 Be firm. In a friendly but firm manner, politely inform third parties that you have to interview the respondent in privacy without interruptions according to the Director's instructions. This study calls for the study of individual citizens and is not for group discussion. We cannot make exceptions to this rule.
- 4.3 Interview the person on the list, not his or her father or anyone else but that person. No substitutes allowed.
- 4.4 Record "open-ended-question" responses verbatim to the best of your ability. Also please write as legibly as you can.
- 4.5 Complete the interview as quickly as you can without skipping questions. If someone wants to talk about the convention center or the rapid transit system, politely respond, saying "That sounds really exciting ... but what would you say about this question, Mr. Kalani?
- 4.6 Continue your interviewing while you write. If you let a silence last, the respondent is likely to be distracted or bored.
- 4.7 Repeat questions only once or twice if the respondent fails to understand or rejects a question. Repeat it as written without making any effort to explain or interpret. After it is repeated twice, record her/his response and move on to the next question even if s/he did not understand the question. Do not go back to the question afterward.
- 4.8 Thank the respondent for her/his cooperation after the interview is completed.
- 4.9 If a respondent refuses to answer a particular question, accept a refusal with grace and move on to the next question.

SPECIAL INTERVIEWING INSTRUCTIONS THE 1999-2000 HONOLULU VOTER SAMPLE

SURVEY

There are several items with which all interviewers need to become familiar to be effective interviewers for the 1999-2000 Honolulu voter survey. These instructions assume familiarity with general principles of interviewing.

- 1. Anyone who identifies herself/himself as a Japanese American, American of Japanese ancestry, or Japanese should be interviewed further on additional items appearing on a three-page survey questionnaire. The sole criterion for identifying a Japanese American subject is strictly based upon one's SELF IDENTIFICATION.
- 2. For certain questions, we have prepared answer cards or answer sheets which list all response categories, save "DK." The first question requiring an answer card is # 07. After reading the question, you are asked to hand over the card to the respondent, who will read the available response categories while you read them aloud. Whenever a capital letter appears in a pair of brackets, it signifies the need to use an answer card. For the Japanese American questionnaire, instead of letters, Arabic numerals are used to signify the location of items requiring the use of an answer sheet/card.

You are asked to turn in your completed questionnaires as soon as you complete the first two or three interviews so that we can ensure that your work is carried out with the validity and reliability we require. After that, you are required to report back to us at least once a week to turn in the completed questionnaires. Payment will be made on the 1st and 16th of each month. Each payment will reflect the total number of interviews completed and verified. All efforts will be made to treat you fairly so that you do not have to go to Koko Head and Kalihi on the same evening.

We would like to see everyone complete at least five or six a week on average so that we can complete the interviewing before the end of this Semester. Those who can work more hours are welcome to do so. If you have any questions regarding the interviewing, please contact Dr. Kuroda.

Calling Instructions

- 1. Each cluster contains 5 names with their address. You are requested to start calling from the person whose name appears on the top and go down the list.
- 2. In so doing, you are requested to try to reach the person on the top of the list at least five times over two or three days before you give up and go down the list. For example, if you could not reach the person early in the evening, try again after 8:00 to see if the person is back.
- 3. If you encounter anyone whose English is not good enough to be interviewed over the phone, terminate and go down the list. Please do not translate any questions into her or his language.
- 4. If anyone wishes to know about Election Services Hawaii Inc. It is headed by Dr. Kuroda who has been doing polling since the 1950s in Hawaii and elsewhere.
- 5. If a person has moved, find out where the person has moved to. If it is within the same district, please call the person. If not, please report to the Director for further instruction.
- 6. If a person is deceased or no longer in residence in Hawaii, please so note and go down the list.
- 7. If you encounter a problem you cannot handle, please report to the Director.
