

1. Introduction

This report presents the main results of the USA Civil Society Survey of "Public Opinion Survey on People's Political Participation and Social Contribution: Cross-National Comparison of Civil Societies," which was conducted under the research project "Cross-National Comparison of the Nonprofit Activities in Japan, USA and Korea".

1.1. Background

People are apt to pay their attention to the actions of the governments of different countries to deal with problems extant in international relations. We, however, should never forget that the public opinions, attitudes and activities of the citizens influence policy decisions in democratic countries. Thus, it is very important to conduct statistical surveys to know and compare the current civil movements in different countries in order to understand international relations.

This survey research intends to capture such civil attitudes and behaviors that effect policy decisions. In particular, it aims to describe the actual context of participation in the nonprofit sector, and people's involvement in the social contribution as well as their attitudes toward such activities. In doing so, we hope to capture the fundamental values that support such activities and attitudes.

A survey in a single country at one time, however, cannot draw the feature of the target society well. Thus, this research adopts the viewpoint of the cross-national comparison and aims to describe civil activities through a comparative study of Japan, the United States of America, and Korea.

There exist many cross-national comparative surveys concerning individual attitudes such as the World Values Surveys (Inglehart et al.), the ISSP (International Social Survey Program) outside Japan. Meanwhile, in Japan the East Asia Value Survey and the Asia-Pacific Value Survey are projects in which P.I. Matsumoto and some research collaborators of this project have been involved². There are also other projects as the EASS (East Asia Social Survey), and the Asia Barometer. However, all these surveys aimed to shed light on values, sense of trust, and general social attitudes; civil activities were secondary.

This survey research conducts the statistical surveys of Japan, the United States of America, and South Korea for the purpose of understanding the development of the nonprofit sector³. This research will be a cross-national comparison study that can contribute to the resolution of various international issues by describing the actual situation of civil societies supported by voluntary civil activities and citizen's attitudes toward them.

1.2. Survey Topics

In deciding on the topics to be included for the survey conducted in Japan in 2007, our aim was to include items that we believed would be effective in measuring people's levels of political participation and social contribution (e.g., attitudes toward daily life, international exchanges; thoughts about the volunteer activities, elections, and so on), while referring partly to existing survey research from the past. We intended to make it a survey research project about the civil society conceived mainly as the collection of non-profit sectors of the economy in a broad sense.

In conducting this USA version of the survey based on the previous Japanese version, we excluded questions that would either not make sense in the American context, or those that were not of primary importance to begin with. Further, because the USA version was over telephone, we excluded questions that were either difficult to convey over that medium or did not appear to be of significant importance relative to the length of time needed to be explained. On the other hand, there were some questions that we nevertheless elected to retain in some form by changing the wording, or using concepts and phrases that would be more appropriate in the American context, in spite of their apparent candidacy in the above-mentioned kinds of questions.

1.3. Overview of the USA Survey

The sampling and fieldwork for the USA Civil Society Survey was consigned to the Abt-SRBI Inc., with the legal procedures mediated by the Shin Jyoho Center. The following is an overview of the survey research project, as described in reports and briefings prepared by the Abt-SRBI Inc.

(1) Target Population

US citizens aged 18 and over; residing in the United States and being able to understand and speak English.

(2) Mode of Survey

CATI (computer-assisted telephone interviewing)

(3) Survey Area

The mainland USA excluding Alaska and Hawaii.

(4) Sampling Method for Households and Persons

For Household: List-Assisted RDD

For Individual Person: Last-Birthday Selection Method

* The sampling area (entire mainland USA) was stratified into 4 regions; the method used to select individual persons can be called the stratified two-stage sampling.

(5) Sample Size

Target Sample Size = 1000, Actual Sample Size = 1005

(6) Pre-test

On December 3rd, 2008 (Wed.), a pre-test session involving 10 men and women aged 18 or above was conducted at a call center operated by the Abt-SRBI Inc., in New York. It was found that it took an interview on average 21.3 minutes to finish.

(7) Time Period for Fieldwork

December 11, 2008 (Thurs.) to January 18, 2009 (Sun.)

* Operation was suspended on certain days such as Christmas and the New Year's Day.

(8) Call Design

The survey began with a 10-call design. However, on January 15, 2009, in the last scheduled week for data collection, the survey shifted to the 13-call design.

(9) Time of Day for Interviews (Time zone based on the interviewee side)

Weekdays: 9 AM ~ 9 PM

Saturday: 10 AM ~ 4 PM; 5 PM ~ 9 PM

Sunday: Noon ~ 9 PM

* If respondents so requested, the interviewers called them outside these specified hours.

(10) Incentives

A 10 USD check was mailed upon completion.

(11) Letters, etc.

No pre-notification letter, refusal conversion letter, or non-contact letter was used.

(12) Type of Phone Targeted

This survey only targeted landline phones, and excluded any cell phone numbers.

(13) Language

Limited to English.

1.4. Linkages of the Cross-National Comparisons

Because the USA survey was over telephone, compared with the Japanese survey conducted earlier the surveys involved elements of both international comparison as well as inter-modal comparison between different modes of data collection. In order to enhance the possibility for comparison, we elected to conduct a phone survey in Japan, too. As a result, this USA survey is part of a broader effort to perform comparative studies through linkages involving different locations as well as methods of data collection.

2. Survey Operation and Final Sample Disposition

The USA Civil Society Survey was conducted between December 11th, 2008 (Thu.) and January 18, 2009 (Sun.), with the targeted population being men and women aged 18 years or over. The fieldwork of the data collection was performed at the call centers of the Abt SRBI Inc., located in Hadley, New York and Fort Myer.

Below we describe details regarding when and how the phone calls were made in this survey, based on the reports, call records and the tabulations of completed samples as prepared by the Abt SRBI, Inc.

2.1. Call design and Callback Strategy

While in this survey the targeted sample size was 1000, we were actually able to obtain responses from 1005 people. The total number of phone numbers used was 15170, while the total number of physical call attempts made was (including errors, and so on) was 64130. Table 2.1 shows a breakdown of the 64130 call attempts categorized as the n^{th} attempt to a same number, as well as by the percentages of interviews completed within that n^{th} attempt.

As to the call design, we initially adopted a 10-call design plan, meaning that the maximum number of callback attempts that would be made to a given phone number was limited to 10. However, on January 13th —which fell on the last week of the data collection phase—the maximum number of attempts was raised to (i.e., the 13-call design was adopted) to improve the response rate generally, and in particular among the Hispanic households.

There were also some exceptional cases in which additional attempts were made beyond the pre-set limit in order to finish an interview that was nearing completion, or to increase the response rate toward the end of the data collection period. Because of this, call attempts to certain numbers went beyond the 13th attempt. Also, callbacks to a given number during the daylight hours were made when there was an agreement to make such a callback at a specified time, or when it was not possible to make a contact during other times of a day. The CATI system used by the Abt-SRBI Inc. is designed to first select a number scheduled for callback on a specified time and day before any fresh number is chosen from the database.

Beyond these measures, it is reported that the Abt SRBI Inc. adopted the following policies in order to obtain as high a response rate as possible.

- A particularly careful attention and consideration was given to the introductory explanations as well as the
 first few questions. It is known that when the initial question fails to meet the expectations respondents
 might have of a survey, the session is likely to be immediately terminated.
- 2. Every interviewer was trained specifically in the methods and procedures needed to deal with respondents who hesitate, are disinterested, or oppositional from the contact phase of the survey.
- 3. Response rates by individual interviewers were monitored so that those with unacceptably low rates of participation may be retrained or removed from the project altogether as needed.
- 4. Efforts at refusal conversion were made from about 1 week to 10 days after the initial refusal (so as to allow enough time such that the contacted might change his/her mind) by a specially trained conversion team.

Further, the CATI system used by the Abt-SRBI Inc. records the exact dates and times of all calls made. Table 2.2 shows a breakdown of the calls by the days and dates, while Table 2.3 shows a breakdown by the time of the day.

2.2 Final Sample Disposition

Table 2.5 shows a breakdown of the eventual outcomes of all the 15170 attempts.

Examples of the Disposition Categories:

- 1) No answer: No one answered the call physically.
- 2) Health/deaf/deceased: The contacted could not answer for health-related reasons, nor was an adult proxy able to do so.
- 3) Respondent away for duration: The targeted respondent could not be reached within the data collection period for this survey.
- 4) Soft Refusal (CB): The targeted respondent refused to participate upon initial contact. In this case a callback attempt was scheduled.
- 5) Hard Refusal: The targeted respondent refused for the second time, following a callback or conversion attempt.
- 6) Qualified Refusals: The targeted respondent did not finish the survey after starting it.
- 7) Screen-out: The household did not meet qualifications specified for inclusion in the survey.
- 8) Qualified HH, Maximum Attempts: The interviewer could not enter into a dialogue with the targeted respondent by the 10th call attempt, as specified by the call design.

#### 4. Resources

#### 4.1 Explanation of the List of the Related Questions

This list of the related questions with other surveys was compiled from the questions used in this survey and their related questions in other surveys. Related questions that the principal investigator was involved in are described in the following.

#### [Surveys]

- Japan Survey 08: Denotes Japanese version of this Civil Society Survey. The USA Civil Society Survey is
  American installment of the "Public Opinion Survey on People's Political Participation and Social Contribution:
  Cross-National Comparison of Civil Societies". Because the Japanese and USA installments differ in the
  numbering schemes for their corresponding questions, the question numbers for both are shown in the following
  table.
- KS: KS denotes the "Survey of the Japanese National Character [Nipponjin no Kokuminsei Chosa (1953–)]." The numerals expressed in the form "# Number" under the column headed "KS" indicate the number of the common codes for the questionnaire items in every Survey of the Japanese National Character. See "Research Committee on the Study of the Japanese National Character (2004, 2007)" or the website <a href="http://www.ism.ac.ip/kokuminsei/">http://www.ism.ac.ip/kokuminsei/</a> (in Japanese) for the related details.
- Trend 07: Trend 07 stands for the "Nipponjin no Kokuminsei ni Kansuru Ishiki Doukou Chosa (2007 fiscal year) [Trend Survey 2007 of the Japanese National Character]." The items expressed as "2007qNumber" other than those expressed in the form "# Number" in the columns headed "KS" indicate the number of the questionnaire items in the "Nipponjin no Kokuminsei ni Kansuru Ishiki Doukou Chosa (2007 fiscal year) [Trend Survey 2007 of the Japanese National Character]." The Survey (Trend Survey 2007 of the Japanese National Character)" was conducted around the same time as the Civil Society Survey, and the two surveys contain some common questions, including new trial questions. (The details will be published in the near future.)
- CNC: CNC refers to a series of the cross-national comparison surveys, for example, the "East Asia Value Survey" and the "Asia-Pacific Value Survey." "02," "04A," and "04B" at the left-hand side of the symbol ":", respectively denote the "Japan 2002 Survey," the "Japan 2004A Survey" and the "Japan 2004B Survey" in the "East Asia Value Survey." At the right-hand side of the symbol ":" are the question numbers in the surveys. Incidentally, the "Japan 2004A Survey" in the "East Asia Value Survey" is referred to as the Japan Survey in the "Asia-Pacific Value Survey." For details on these surveys, please refer to the website of "Data Archive of Cross-National Comparative Survey of National Character (http://www.ism.ac.jp/~yoshino/)," as well as to sources such as Yoshino (2004), Yoshino & Matsumoto (2007).
- JGSS: JGSS denotes the "Japanese General Social Surveys (2000—) (alias name: International Comparative Survey on Values and Behavioral Patterns)." All the variable names occurring in the surveys conducted through various years are consistent across the series of JGSS, so the variable names are used in the column headed "JGSS" to show related questionnaire items, not the questionnaire item numbers in each survey. Refer to the website of the JGSS (<a href="http://jgss.daishodai.ac.jp/">http://jgss.daishodai.ac.jp/</a>) or the codebooks for each Japanese General Social Survey such as the Institute of Regional Studies, Osaka University of Commerce & Institute of Social Science, University of Tokyo (2007). Note that every issue of the JGSS contains two types of questionnaires—a face-to-face survey and a self-administered survey, if you use results of the related questions of JGSS for comparison analysis. Asterisks (*) marked on the variable names of the questionnaire items pertain to the items in the self-administered surveys.

#### [Symbols]

- \$: The items marked with the symbol "\$" are considered to have a high comparability; some of them are common to those in other surveys.
- ~: This symbol is used to explain the difference from the question in this survey. On the left-hand side of the symbol is the content or expression used in the other surveys; on the right-hand side is the content or expression used in this survey.
- *: The variable names marked with the symbol * indicate the questions in the questionnaires used for the self-administered surveys in JGSS.
