はしがき

本書は、日本学術振興会の科学研究費補助金の支援による「アジア・太平洋価値観国際 比較調査…文化多様体の統計科学的解析…」(基盤研究 S 課題番号 No.22223006、研究代 表 吉野諒三)(2010年度・2014年度)の USA2010年調査の第1次報告を、統計数理研究 所・調査研究リポートとして発刊したものである。

本調査研究は先行する 2002-2005 年度の「東アジア価値観国際比較調査」、および 2006-2009 年度の「環太平洋価値観国際比較調査」の拡大を意図した調査研究の一環であ り、2010 年度は日本と米国において、それぞれの国に応じた統計的標本抽出法に則り、面 接調査が遂行された。日米ともほぼ同期間に調査が遂行されたが、米国は中間選挙後、日 本は 2011 年東日本大震災前となった。

この研究は、歴史的には統計数理研究所における 1953 年以来の「日本人の国民性」調 査及び 1971 年以来の「意識の国際比較」調査の延長上にある。「日本人の国民性」調査は、 戦後民主主義の基盤としての官民の世論調査発展と緊密に結びつき、「意識の国際比較」調 査は、連鎖的調査分析 (Cultural Linkage Analysis, CLA)の確立へとつながった。そし てさらに、最近行われた我々の他の国際比較調査研究とともに、この研究は、計量的文明 論としての「文化多様体解析 (Cultural Manifold Analysis, CULMAN)」という方法論の 確立を目指す研究の一環として位置づけられている。

本研究の背景と意義は、以下の通りである。

冷戦が終了し、世界情勢のダイナミックな変動とともに、政治、経済、社会の伝統的枠 組が大きく変わり、社会生活の基盤であった人々の信頼のあり方も大きな影響を受けてい る。伝統的な産業社会から高度情報化社会への過渡期と見られる現在、従来の家庭、学校、 職場での人間関係のあり方にも崩壊が生じ、新たな時代の流れが確立するまでの混乱が続 いてきた。日本経済はバブル崩壊以降、「失われた 10 年」と言われたが、その状況は改善 されたわけではない。

一方、政治経済の視点からは、欧州共同体や南北アメリカ圏のみならず、東アジア圏の 再編成が唱えられている。東南アジアを含む東アジア圏は、欧州とは異なり、多様な文化、 歴史を持つ国々や地域の集合であり、政治にせよ経済にせよ、それらの統合は必ずしも容 易ではないであろうが、現実には ASEAN 等の協力関係が推進されつつある。我々が 2002 年の東アジア価値観調査の計画した時には、「東アジア」という言葉はまだ一般には、地理 的に曖昧なものでしかなかった。その後、「東アジア共同体」構想についての議論が高まり、 特に戦後長期に継続した自民党政権から民主党の鳩山政権になり、その構想が掲げられた が、沖縄米軍基地移転問題などを含め、日中米の国際関係の中で警戒感を巻き起こし、交 代した菅政権では、その言葉は消えてしまった。ただし、アジアと太平洋の各国の多様な 協力、多重の連携協力は着実に推進されており、「アジア・太平洋共同体 (APEC)」や「環 太平洋戦略的経済連携協定 (TPP)」等々の国際協力の枠組みの検討が始まり、あたかも「文 化の多様体」(吉野,2005; Yoshino, Nikaido & Fujita, 2009)が構築されているかのようで ある。

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こういった世界の流れを適格に把握し、将来を見通すための実証的基礎情報を収集すべ く、各国、各機関が様々な社会調査、国際比較調査を遂行している。例えば、世界価値観 調査(World Values Survey)は、世界の20~30数カ国で共通質問項目を用いた国際比較 調査データや時系列比較可能なデータを提供し、学術研究にも行政施策にも資するところ が大きい。しかしながら、過去の東アジア地域における調査の実情を詳細に調べてみると、 その結果には疑いが隠せない。国際比較調査では、質問項目を各国の言語に適切に翻訳す ることが重要な手続きであるが、各国内の事情の差異を見過ごしたための誤訳が見受けら れ、また、報告された回収率などから、計画された統計的無作為標本抽出の手続きが調査 の現場でどこまで遵守されているのか、疑義を持つ調査研究者も少なくない。

以上のような背景があり、我々は、アジア・太平洋地域の調査は、やはり当該地域の人々 によって慎重に推進されるべきであるという認識に至った。我々は、各国でどの程度統計 学的に適正な標本抽出調査が遂行でき、また国際比較可能性が保てるのかという課題を自 ら実証的に検討することを主眼にし、それを把握した上でアジア・太平洋諸国の人々の価 値観や意識を比較分析する課題に取り組んできた。現実には、各国で日常、厳密な統計調 査がどの程度なされているか、それ自体が各国の政治・経済・社会の状況を如実に表して いることが強く認識されている。

今回の調査票は、一般社会意識調査としてのスタイルをとり、人々の生活一般に関する 多様な項目を含んでいる。しかし、特に 21 世紀初頭の急変しつつある世界情勢、そして その中でも、急速に変化するアジア・太平洋の国々と、数々の問題を抱えながらも再秩序 化されつつある国家間の関係を考慮して、日本と他のアジア・太平洋諸国の人々の価値観、 対人的信頼感や法意識を含む人間関係に関する意識、自然観や生命観の統計的解明に適切 と思われる項目を検討した。結果として、多くの項目は、2002-2005 年度の「東アジア価 値観国際比較調査」及び 2006-2009 年度の「環太平洋価値観国際比較調査」と重複してい るので、重複して調査されている国や地域については、この 10 年ほどの時系列調査とも なっている。

社会調査、特に国際比較調査では費用、時間、労力のみならず様々な技術的な限界が常 に付き纏うものであり、目前の多様な問題解決へ直ちに繋がるような調査項目の選定は容 易ではない。今後の各方面での調査データや情報を、相補的に考慮して研究を推進するの みである。

アジア・太平洋諸国の社会状態は複雑であり、特に中国、そしてインドの躍進は目覚ま しいものがある。一方でどの国も政治的にも決して一枚岩ではなく、地域や階層の間の大 きな経済格差を抱え、それが国際関係の進展にも影を投げ、将来を予測するのは容易では ない。それゆえに、各国の客観的実態統計とともに、各国民の意識や価値観の動向を的確 に調査する意義がある。我々の基本方針は、現地で通常用いられている調査方法を尊重し、 その実態を学ぶことである。国や地域によっては、しばしば、回収データの質の低さの点 で、これまで我々が遂行してきた国や地域と比較して、統計的方法論や実践的手続きなど の諸問題に憂いを抱かざるを得ないが、調査研究者としてはそのようなデータの中から、 いかに信頼できる情報を抽出できるか考えていかねばならない。

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国際比較としての詳細なデータ解析も、実際の調査では避けられない各国・各地域の言 語の差異、調査方法の差異などを考慮し、単純に回答分布の皮相な数字の大小比較ではな く、今後収集されていく他の関連諸国・地域の調査データや資料、情報とともに、慎重に 時間をかけて安定したパターン構造を浮かび上がらせるような分析がなされて行くべきで ある。それゆえ、本報告書は、国内外の多くの方々に速やかに基本情報を提供すべく、一 次報告として刊行されている旨を御了解願いたい。

※今回の米国調査は、20011 年 3 月 11 日に日本で起きた東日本大地震の前に遂行され たものであり、当然、米国でもその影響は受けていない。米国西海岸の一部でも津波被害 が生じたが、米国政府は、震災後ただちに the operation "Tomodachi" (friends)を実行 に移し、日本での災害被害者の救出、復興支援、巨大地震の 2 次災害となった福島原子力 発電所事故の対応への協力を推進させている。我々の調査データを解析する際に、こうい った状況がその後どのように影響を与えているかについても留意すべきであろう。

1. Introduction

This is a report on USA 2010 Survey as part of "Asia-Pacific Values Survey" (2010-2014 fiscal years) by the cross-national survey team of the Institute of Statistical Mathematics (Chief: Ryozo Yoshino). We are developing this study in order to exemplify practical research of a new methodology for cross-national comparative survey, called CULMAN (Cultural Manifold Analysis) (See Yoshino, 2005; Yoshino, Nikaido & Fujita, 2009).

This brief monograph gives some historical background of the study. On the other hand, we would like to refer readers to Yoshino (2001, 2005c, 2006, 2009), Yoshino & Hayashi (2001), and Yoshino, Nikaido & Fujita (2009) for more detailed English explanation on the methodologies such as back translation technique for questionnaire and statistical random sampling, a paradigm of cross-national comparability, etc. As for the information on our past surveys, see a series of ISM Research Reports published over decades, or our home page of the Institute of Statistical mathematics. 2. Some History on Our National Character Survey

The Institute of Statistical Mathematics (ISM) has been conducting a longitudinal nationwide social survey on the Japanese national character every five years since 1953, using the same questionnaire items (Mizuno et al., 1992). The survey is called "Nihonjin no Kokuminsei Chosa" (Japanese National Character Survey). Although definition of the term "national character" may be very problematic, here it simply means the characteristic shown in people's response patterns to a questionnaire survey (Hayashi et al., 1998; cf. Inkeles, 1997). The question items cover various aspects of people's opinions about their culture and daily life. This survey was one of the foundations of the public opinion survey system based on the statistical sampling theory developed immediately after World War II in Japan. The significance of this survey was clear at the time when Japan was expected to shift from the military regime to a democratic system in the latter half of 1940s (Yoshino, 1994). This survey stimulated many countries to carry out the same sort of time series surveys such as the World Value Survey, Eurobarometer, General Social Survey (GSS) of USA, ALLBUS of

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Germany, CREDOC of France, etc. (There was a time that the post-war Japanese democracy had been criticized because it was not democratic from a viewpoint of the Western world. Interestingly, however, Japan conducts public opinion polls based on statistically ideal sampling using an almost complete residential or voters' list whereas the other countries have to use other methods such as quota sampling or random route sampling. The latter two sampling methods consider statistical randomness but do not yield the statistical estimate of sampling errors. As far as the system of public opinion polls is concerned, therefore, Japan may be more democratic than the Western countries in the sense of inclusiveness and representativeness.)

Since 1971, the survey of ISM has been extended to a cross-national comparative study for more advanced understanding of Japanese national character (Hayashi, 1973). The focus of our cross-national surveys is the investigation of the statistical comparison of peoples' social values and their ways of thinking and feeling. More explicitly, our concern has been with cultural identities and people's attitudes toward economy, freedom of speech, interpersonal relationships, leadership, politics, public acceptance of science and technology, religion, social security, etc. These aspects may clarify certain similarities or dissimilarities that are represented by psychological distances between countries or races in certain statistical pattern analyses of responses (Hayashi, 2001a, 2001b; Hayashi et al., 1998; Yoshino, 1994, 2001c).

Note: Although the Japanese title of the survey project 2004-2009 literally means the Pacific-Rim Values Survey, the title "The Asia-Pacific Values Survey" was occasionally used for the project in the past English publication, because it covered not only Pacific-Rim Area but India. From now on, we designate the Pacific-Rim Values Survey (effectively 1st round of the Asia-Pacific Values Survey) for the 2004-2009 project and the Asia-Pacific Values Survey for the 2010-2014 project (effectively 2nd round the Asia-Pacific Values Survey).

The cross national survey, however, involves particular methodological problems. It is not simple to compare response data collected under different conditions. Different countries may use the same questionnaire but in different languages and employ different statistical sampling methods as well. There is no a priori knowledge as to how these different conditions influence peoples' responses even in the case where there is no substantive difference of opinions and social values between peoples (Yoshino, 2001c). Thus, an important problem of our study is to investigate those conditions under which meaningful cross-national comparability of social survey data is guaranteed. As our approach towards this problem over decades, we have been developing the methodology called CLA (cultural link analysis). The main components of CLA are 1) a spatial link for cross-national comparison, 2) a temporal link inherent in longitudinal analysis, and 3) an item-structure link inherent in the commonalties and differences in item response patterns within and across different cultures (cf. Guttman, 1972). In CLA we utilize, for example, the back translation technique and statistical pattern analyses such as Hayashi's Quantification Method (Hayashi, 1992) or Yoshino's (1992a, 1992b, 1994, 2001c) Super-culture Model. The utilization of those pattern analyses consists of an important part of our methodology. Namely, although a simple cross-national tabulation of people's responses with respect to a single item may not be reliable because people's responses may occasionally be sensitive to slight differences in the wording of certain questions, certain pattern analyses or scaling on a set of items can be reliable. (See Yoshino & Hayashi [2002] for an overview on our approach.)

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On the other hand, in this cross-national study, we have found some response tendencies particular to certain countries. For example, the Japanese tend to avoid polar answer categories and to choose intermediate categories, whereas the French generally tend to give negative responses to any question. (Here I may be exaggerating these tendencies to make the points clearer.) I think that we should consider these response tendencies when we analyze not only people's sense of trust but public opinion polls or social survey data in general.

See Hayashi (2001a, 2001b), Hayashi et al. (1998), Yoshino (1994, 2001c, 2002, 2005, 2006, 2009), Yoshino & Hayashi (2002), Yoshino, Nikaido & Fujita (2009), and Yoshino, Hayashi & Yamaoka (2010) for results of our cross-national surveys.

3. Japanese national character survey (1953-present)

Our longitudinal survey of Japanese national character shows some stable aspects of attitudes and social values of the Japanese (Hayashi & Kuroda, 1997; Yoshino, 1994). Among others, the stability of interpersonal attitudes and religious attitudes may distinguish the Japanese from other countries. Namely, the Japanese show a higher score on the "Giri-Ninjyo scale" than the other countries. Moreover, while only one third of the Japanese have religious faith, but more than 60% of the Japanese support the opinion that religious attitudes are important (Yoshino & Hayashi, 2002; Yamaoka, 2000).

I will briefly explain certain fundamental dimensions of the Japanese social values as follows.

Fundamental dimensions of the Japanese social values

Hayashi (1993) has identified two important dimensions that underlie the Japanese national character in the survey. That is, 1) the dimension of interpersonal relationships ("Giri-Ninjyo" attitude, or a complicated sense of humanity and obligation that is particular to the Japanese interpersonal relationships) and 2) the dimension of a modern-traditional contrast in their way of thinking. On one hand, as mentioned before, the Japanese interpersonal attitude has been stable, at least over the last half century, and probably for much longer than our longitudinal survey. This corresponds to the first dimension. On the other hand, for over 100 years since the Meiji Restoration in 1868, Japan has been doing her best to overtake Western science and technology and to develop it into a Japanese adaptation. Probably this enduring effort has underlined the dimension of the tradition vs. modernity orientation in the Japanese way of thinking.

However, the Japanese way of thinking has been gradually changing, and there appeared a generation gap between people of 20-24 years old and those older than 25 years in our survey of 1978 (note that the younger generation was born more than 10 years after the end of World War II. In 1956, an economic white paper declared, "Japan is no longer in the post-war condition," and this symbolized the start of the high-speed

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development of industry and economy. On the other hand, however, Japan had to face many social problems concerning pollution because of the high speed industrialization around 1970. Since the signs of the younger generation's changes appeared as early as 1978, their current way of thinking has become more complicated than ever.

Furthermore, the Japanese have been in the confusion of the transition period from the established social system to a system of a highly advanced information age. In this confusion, a Central Research Services, Inc. (2000) survey reports of the majority of Japanese people's distrust toward traditional systems such as banking, bureaucracy, as well as of congressmen, police, etc., in spite of the stereotype of the Japanese as a highly trustful nation (Fukuyama, 1995).

4. The World as a Cultural Manifold

The 20th century was the time of expansion of Western civilization. Differences of cultures occasionally prevented us from our understanding each other. In this time of globalization, I would like to emphasize the fact that there are various ways of successful social development, therefore, we should not impose one's own social value on any other country if we intend to develop a peaceful world.

The globalization necessarily changes some institutional systems and customs towards more universal ones under the influences of transnational exchange or trade. On the other hand, some other systems are becoming more and more sensitive to cultural differences, as a reaction to the globalization.

In order to facilitate the mutual understanding between the East and the West, we need to keep in mind the differences of social values between them. The study on the scale of trust (Yoshino, 2005, 2006, 2008) may caution us on the applicability of a certain "single" scale invented by the Western cultures to the Eastern cultures, or vice versa. For example, it is not always the case in Asia that "the distrust is a culture of poverty" as Banfield (1958) once mentioned. A Chinese proverb says that "Fine manners need a full stomach" (or "The belly has no ears"), but another says "Be contended with honest poverty." Gallup (1977, p.461) reported that they could not find a very poor but still happy people in their global survey. I think that they missed the reality. For example, Brazilians were very optimistic even when Brazil fell down to the worst debtor nation in the world (Inkeles, 1997). Inglehart reported a correlation of .57 between economic development and life satisfaction for some 20 countries surveyed in 1980s (Inkeles, 1997, pp. 366-371). But the life satisfaction of Japan in the 1980's was lower than around 2000, although Japan was close to the top of the world economy in those days and now she has been suffering from depression over years. Thus, we need scales constructed from various perspectives or social values in order to understand various cultures in the age of globalization.

Although China had so many battles between small countries (within the area corresponding to the modern China) over thousands of years in their history, once they

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were synthesized as a large empire, their government employed peoples of various races as high-class bureaucrats. This made it possible for them to develop and maintain a large empire and their culture, often over centuries. This is analogous to the Roman Empire, but it is contrastive to the modern Western countries (and Japan during WWII) that colonized Asian and African countries in the 19th and 20th centuries. The history shows that trust between different races changes according to social conditions in the short run, although it is relatively stable over time.

After our previous China survey (China 2001 survey [Yoshino, 2006]), there occurred the problem of SARS spreading from Guang-Zhou in China. People inside and outside China criticized the local governments, suspecting that they attempted to hide the serious conditions. This seems to suggest a significant change of China, from secretive attitude to more open attitude for every matter. The secretive attitude was linked to the system of severe punishment on political responsibility. The open attitude is a key to democracy that is necessary for successful capitalism. The then mayor of Beijing got fired because of his mishandling of SARS. The government started encouraging people to inform of the presence of patients. This situation seems to show that China is changing rapidly, but in a Chinese way. Here it may be important to quote Dogan (2000)'s statement"... Erosion of confidence is first of all a sign of political maturity. It is not so much that democracy has deteriorated, but rather the critical spirit of most citizens has improved..."

In spite of prevailing confusion in East Asia (actually in the entire world), I hope that East Asia will advance towards the peaceful development without serious conflicts. For the mutual understanding among Asian countries, one should keep in mind their ways of thinking such as "Mentsu (face)" and "Honne and Tatemae (real intension and principle)" of the Chinese, the Japanese, and the Korean. This is also the case with the Asian countries for their understanding of the West.

Once upon a time, Weber (1904-05) argued that Asian countries were not able to develop capitalism in his theory on religion and capitalism. Now we know so many counter-examples such as Japan, Korea, NIES, and China, against his argument. Some people argued that the Japanese adaptation of Confucius philosophy adapted to Japan functioned as a replacement of Protestant ethics and led Japan to a successful development of capitalism (Morishima, 1984). But the past decades have seen many examples to show that economic success is not linked to a particular ethics, ideology or religion. Now we have more and more data to consider the relationships between economic development, social systems and social values because of the rapid change of social systems in many countries of the world than before.

In 2010 spring, we started a new project "Asia-Pacific Values Survey" and carried out a nationwide face-to-face survey in Jap and USA during November of 2010 to January of 2011. This project will cover at least all the countries and areas of the previous project "Pacific Rim Values Survey", and possibly other countries such as Philippines, Thailand, and Vietnam.

I hope that our survey data will be helpful for further constructive arguments, and the mutual understanding for the peaceful development and economic prosperity of the world.

Note 1: JAPAN 2010 Survey was carried out before the Tohoku earthquake (March 11, 2011). The disaster, and the incidents at Fukushima nuclear plants, must have significantly influenced the minds and sprits of many Japanese people in one way or another. The United State government immediately started the operation "Tomodachi (friends)" in order to rescue the large number of causalities, support their recovery and control the nuclear plants in Japan, even though some area of the west coast in USA also suffered from the tsunami. We believe that these factors need to be taken into consideration in analyzing data from some of the items in this survey.

統計的標本抽出調査が可能なアジア・太平洋諸国(日本、中国、台湾、韓国、シンガポール、 インド、アメリカ、オーストラリア等)において、各国の標本抽出方法や調査票翻訳の問題 などの国際比較可能性の程度を勘案しながら、人々の意識構造の個別訪問面接調査を遂行する。 この過程において、これまで開発してきた各種の多変量解析などを活用し、人々の意識構造 を人間関係の在り方や「信頼感」を中心に、多層的にデータ解析する。(米国 GSS 等で活用さ れている「一般的信頼感」に関する尺度等のみによる単純な分析では、多様な文化の相違を 前提とする国際比較には堪えがたいことに留意する。)

他方で、その国際比較という空間の軸に対し、「日本人の国民性」の継続調査の時間軸 (時系列比較)と絡め、日本人の意識構造の安定性と変容を、総合的に解明する。

成果は、調査データの詳細は、調査ごとに直ちに「統計数理研究所リポート」として発刊し、 研究成果は国内外の学会で発表する。また最終的に収集された国際比較データのセットは、 プライバシーの保護を含む、調査の倫理に配慮し、問題の生じない形で一般公開する。

③)学術的な特色・独創的な点及び予想される結果と意義

上記①で述べたように、本研究は統計科学的な信頼性の高いデータ収集の方法論やデータ 解析の開発をも念頭に置いた半世紀以上にわたる国民性研究の延長上にある。これは統計 数理研究所の調査チームのみならず、それを支えてきた官民学の広範な人々の協力の上に 確立されてきた、日本の独創である。

日本は高齢化社会の中で労働人口が減少し、種々の社会問題を抱え、今日の世界経済での 地位を保ち続けるのは困難となると予想されている。このために特に近隣諸国から外国人 労働者の積極的受け入れ等を始めとして、国際交流がますます必然となろうが、これに伴い、 日常生活の中でも異文化間摩擦が様々な形で現われて来るに違いない。他方で、近年の 「東アジア共同体」の具体化に伴う、EUや南北アメリカ圏との国際関係が構想されている。 しばしば国際社会の中で曖昧な態度が批判される日本ではあるが、むしろ、異文化、異民族に 対する寛容性を積極的に活用して、異なる文化・政治・経済圏を結ぶ懸け橋となるべく生産的 な役割が期待される。その意味でも、異文化間理解、文化変容の研究がますます重要となって くる。

本研究で日本、東アジア、環太平洋を多層的に含む、「アジア・太平洋諸国の国際比較データ」 を、統計科学的に信頼できる方法で適正に収集し、それを公開することで、調査データが広く 世界の人々に活用され、国内外での異文化間摩擦を回避し、世界の秩序の維持と発展の一助と することの意義が了解されるであろう。また、調査データの一般公開により、世界の人文社会 科学の研究者、統計学者の多様な実証的研究をも促進させることが期待されよう。

研究体制は、全体として、調査企画、調査票の作成、標本抽出法の検討等は、研究代表者が研 究分担者及び連携研究者とともに、密接な協力のもとで遂行する(予算執行の事務処理の便宜上、 分担者と連携研究者と弁別しているが、本研究においては、従来と同様、研究チーム全員が本格 的に関与して遂行する)。収集データのクリーニング作業、報告書の取りまとめ、調査報告書など の刊行と国内外への配布作業等は、代表者(吉野)と分担者(土屋)の管理のもとで、補助作業 員を雇用して遂行させる。データ解析は、各人独自に進めるが、適宜、国内外の学会発表などを 利用して、互いに解析結果を検討する。その結果をうけて、研究代表のもとで、最終報告書を作 成する。

平成22年度は、年度の前半では、以下の1)~5)を遂行する。

 基礎資料(アジア・太平洋諸国の関連調査データ、文献等)を収集・整理する。同時に、 我々が過去に収集してきた一連の国際比較調査データや報告書の再整理、国内外の機関 による関連する調査データや報告書の内容を整理、検討する。

2)アジア・太平洋の各地域の調査環境について現状を再確認する。各地の現地調査研究者と 連携しながら、統計的標本抽出方法の実践的検討を行い、その遂行可能性を確認し、同時に 当該地域で国際比較の意味のある調査項目の候補を選定する。

- 5) さらに、米国調査のために、日本調査のプリテスト調査票を複数のバイリンガルにより、 翻訳、再翻訳を繰り返し、米国語のプリテスト調査票を作成する(バック・トランスレー ションによる検討)。

 調査法:住民票や選挙人名簿等から無作為層別2段抽出した対象(個人)に、訪問面接により、調査票に基づいた聞き取り調査を遂行する。名簿閲覧が不能の場合は、エリア・サンプリング等を工夫する。(調査は各地域の大学の協力により、また場合によっては 調査代理機関が遂行する。)

- 調査項目:過去の統計数理研究所の「日本人の国民性」や、「意識の国際比較調査」、 「東アジア価値観国際比較」、「環太平洋価値観国際比較調査」等を参考に、本研究で 対象となる各国々や地域の比較の意義のある、人々の多面的・多次元な一般的意識 構造(人間関係、宗教、教育、健康、家庭、男女の役割 etc.)とともに、特に対人 関係、社会的ネットワーク(ソーシャル・キャピタル)、「信頼感」、集団内や集団間の 「信頼感」、社会制度やリーダーに対する「信頼感」を主とした質問項目を作成する (約 60 項目)。ただし、「信頼感」の測定可能性等の問題点に配慮し、多面的・多次元 的な指標や尺度構成を考案する。

調査対象:米国本土(ハワイやアラスカを除く)に居住し、米国国籍をもつ成人の男女。 計画サンプル数は有効回収数800名以上期待(予算、コスト、現実的な回収率を考慮する)。

<u>調査法</u>: まず、最新のセンサス・データに基づき、米国の該当する全地域から統計的に 無作為に地点を抽出する。次に各地点では、住民票や選挙人名簿等から無作為に抽出 した対象(個人)に、訪問面接により、調査票に基づいた聞き取り調査を遂行する。 名簿閲覧が不能の場合は、エリア・サンプリング等を工夫する。米国の治安問題を含む、 調査環境の質の低さに対して、慎重な検討が必要である。(調査は、統計的に 厳密な面接調査の遂行に十分な実績があり、信頼できる米国の調査代理機関に遂行を

中国(北京・上海・香港)および台湾調査のために、以下の1)と2)の検討作業の後、前年度の1)から7)に対応する作業を進行し、報告書を作成、各方面へ送付する。特に、a)調査国・地域の関連基礎資料やデータを収集・整理、及び b)調査国・地域の標本抽出の実践的検討を 慎重に行い、同時に、22年度の日米調査の調査項目の是非を、国内外の調査関連の研究者との 連携により、検討、確認する。(特に、中国本土は、2008年オリンピック前後からの都市部 の急激な変化に対応した標本抽出方法を再検討する必要があろう。)

研究計画・方法(つづき)

<u>平成 24 年度</u>

韓国、シンガポールおよびオーストラリア調査のために、前年同様に、必要な検討作業 の後、22 年度の1)から7)に対応する作業を進行し、報告書を作成、各方面へ送付する。 ただし、オーストラリアは、その国土の特異性(広大な砂漠があり、人口は限定された都市 部に集中している)ことに十分な配慮を施し、より適正な確率的標本抽出方法の具体策を 決定する。

平成 25 年度

インド調査のために、前年同様に、必要な検討作業の後、22年度の1)から7)に対応する 作業を進行する。

他方で、タイ、マレーシア、フィリピンの各国の都市と地方の一部における面接調査を、 統計技術的な問題やテロ等の治安問題を勘案しながら、小規模でも可能な範囲で遂行する

(注:タイ、マレーシア、フィリピンでは国勢調査すら完全には遂行されて地域もあり、通常、 全国レベルの標本抽出のもととなる詳細なリストが存在せず、一部地域の調査データからの 推計に頼らざるを得ない。)

上記の海外調査に並行して、日本の時系列調査として、「第13回日本人の国民性調査」 を遂行する。この日本調査は過去半世紀にわたる継続調査項目を主とするK型調査と、 将来の変化を見込んだ項目を導入したM型調査との2本の平行調査で構成される。これは、 国際比較版の22年度日本調査とリンクさせることにより、調査データの空間的解析と 時間的解析の比較の要となる。

作業や時間的なスケジュールは、前年度に準じ、最終的に各調査の報告書を作成し、 各方面へ送付する。

22年~25年度に収集した各国の調査データを総合的に分析し、最終報告書の作成と 調査データ公開を中心として作業する。

上記の1)と2)では、文化の「連鎖的比較方法論 CLA」を開発し、3)では日米の比較研 究の中で国際的かつ学際的研究テーマについて CLA の実践的検討を行い、その有効性を確認し た。4)では、それらを発展し、総括した。5)は特定のテーマに焦点を当てた国内での実践 的応用を示し、さらに6)及び7)では海外の日系人に焦点を当て、既存の「日本人の国民性 調査」の時系列的データと「意識の国際比較調査データ」との関連の中で、「文化の伝播変容」 に関して時間・空間的変化を追求した。この中で、日本人や日系人固有の対人関係(義理人情) や宗教意識(信心を持たない人々も「宗教的態度が大切」と考えている等)、回答傾向(極端 な回答を避ける等)が計量的に明瞭になってきた。8)は CLA を東アジア圏に適用し、東アジ アの人々の意識構造を探った。9)では CLA を発展させて、「文化多様体解析 CULMAN」を展開 させ、米国、豪州と東アジア諸国の意識構造の多様性、階層構造を解析した。

特に上記の8)および9)の成果が、本応募申請研究へ直接つながるものである。

広範にわたる調査結果や分析の詳細を一言でまとめるのは難しいが、敢えて上記の一連の研 究の統計学的な方法論に限って要点を述べれば、次の3点にまとめられる。

- 各国や各地域では、名目上は同じ「標本抽出調査」でも、実際は社会的・歴史的事情に より異なる、各々に固有の統計的標本抽出調査が用いられており、国際比較の文脈では、 単純な回答数値の比較のみで議論するのは危険であること。
- 2)国際比較では、異なる言語を用いて「同じ」と想定される質問項目を回答者に施すのであるが、同一言語でも微妙な表現の差異で回答分布に10~15%程度の差異を生み出すこともある(バックトランスレーションによる検討)。
- 3) 上記の1)、2)のような問題点があるため、単一質問項目に対する回答数値を皮相的 に国際比較するのは危険であるが、複数の項目群を活用した統計的(計量心理学的)尺度 構成や多次元データ解析法を適切に用いれば、各国の特徴を比較すべき国々の全体の中で 安定したパターンとして浮かび上がらすことができるのを確認した。我々はこれを、ノイ ズのある現実的データから、より信頼性の高い情報を引き出す探索的データ解析の方法論 またはパラダイムと位置づけ、「データの科学」と称するに至った。

われわれはこういった知見の上に、日本人を含め、各国の人々の意識構造を研究するための文化多様体解析(Cultural Manifold Analysis [CULMAN])という方法論を開発するに至った。

【研究の背景・目的】

統計数理研究所では、1953 年以来、「日本人の 国民性」調査を継続してきた。 この研究は1970 年 頃より国際比較調へと拡張され、「連鎖的比較 (Cultural Link Analysis)」や「文化多様体解析 (Cultural Manifold Analysis)」と呼ばれる方法論 が発展し、「データの科学」という実践パラダイム の展開へ結びついている。

21世紀初頭の今日、世界秩序の再構成が進み、 国家を超えた単位によって構成された国際社会が 生まれつつある。それが世界の平和と繁栄へと繋が るためには、国家間、民族間の円滑な相互理解が 重要である。その成功のためには、現在の国内外の 状況を適確に把握する必要がある。われわれの研究 の主目的は、各国の人々の意識構造の統計科学的 解明にある。

【研究の方法】

特に、以下 a) ~c) に重点をおいて研究を遂行する。 a) 文化の伝播変容を統計科学的に解明するため、 アジア・太平洋諸国の人々の意識構造について統計 的標本抽出法に則った面接調査を遂行する。

b)特に、21世紀における国際交流の中で、アジア ・太平洋諸国民の「信頼感」のあり方に焦点を当て 世界の政治・経済の平和的発展の一助となる基礎 情報の収集を推進させる。

c) 収集した「アジア・太平洋諸国民の意識調査」 の情報を中心に、既存の「意識の国際比較調査」 データとともに世界へ一般公開する。

【期待される成果と意義】

日本は少子高齢化社会の中で労働人口が減少し、

外国人労働者の積極的受け入れ等を始め、国際交 流が必然となろうが、これに伴い、日常生活の中 でも異文化間摩擦が様々な形で現われて来るに違 いない。また、近年の「東アジア共同体」の具体 化に伴う、EUや南北アメリカ圏との国際関係が構 想され、異文化間理解、文化変容の研究がますま す重要となってくる。

[Purpose and Background of the Research]

The Institute of Statistical Mathematics has been conducting a longitudinal nationwide survey on the Japanese national character since 1953 The survey, called "Nihoniin no Chosa" Kokuminsei (Japanese National Character Survey), stimulated many countries to carry out the same sort of time series surveys such as the World Value Survey, Eurobarometer, General Social Survey of USA, ALLBUS of Germany, CREDOC of France, etc.

Since 1971, our survey has been extended to a cross-national comparative study for more advanced understanding of Japanese national character. The focus of our cross-national surveys is the investigation of the statistical comparison of peoples' social values and their ways of thinking and feeling: cultural identities and people's attitudes toward economy, freedom speech, interpersonal. relationships, of leadership, politics, public acceptance of science and technology, religion, social security, etc. These aspects may clarify certain similarities or dissimilarities that are represented bv psychological distances between countries in certain statistical analyses of responses.

[Research Methods]

The cross-national survey involves particular methodological problems to compare response data collected under different conditions. Thus, an important problem of our study is to investigate those conditions under which meaningful cross-national comparability of social survey data is guaranteed. As our approach towards this problem over decades, we have been developing the methodologies called CLA (Cultural Linkage Analysis) and CULMAN (Cultural Manifold Analysis). The main components of CLA are 1) a spatial link for cross-national comparison, 2) a temporal link inherent in longitudinal analysis, and 3) an item-structure link inherent in the commonalties and differences in item response patterns within and across different cultures. CULMAN is a development introducing hierarchical structures into the three types of cultural linkages.

[Expected Research Achievements and Scientific Significance]

In CULMAN we utilize the back-translation technique and statistical pattern analyses such as Hayashi's Quantification Method or Yoshino's Super-culture Model. Although a simple cross-national tabulation of people's responses with respect to a single item may not be reliable because people's responses may occasionally be sensitive to slight differences in the wording of certain questions, certain pattern analyses or scaling on a set of items can be reliable.

On the other hand, we have found some response tendencies particular to certain countries. For example, the Japanese tend to avoid polar answer categories and to choose intermediate categories, whereas the French generally tend to give negative responses to any question. •

We believe that our methodologies will be useful to analyze not only people's sense of trust but public opinion polls or social survey data in general.

1. Survey Design

One thousand and two interviews were completed in the U.S. among a representative national sample of adult U.S. citizens aged 18 and older. Field interviewing began during the first week of December, 2010 and was concluded on January 31, 2011.

2. Sampling

The sample was constructed based on two key variables generated from the 2000 U.S. Census: geographic region and city size/type.

The U.S. is stratified into nine sub-regions, as follows:

New England (NE) Middle Atlantic (MA) East North Central (ENC) East South Central (ESC) South Atlantic (SA) West North Central (WNC) West South Central (WSC) Mountain (M) Pacific (P)

Quotas based on the total 18 and older population were established across the regions as well as for city size/type. The latter was also subdivided into nine categories:

<u>Urban</u> 500,000+ 100,000-500,000 Fewer than 100,000

<u>Urban Fringe</u> 50,000+ 25,000-50,000 10,000-25,000 Fewer than 10,000

<u>Non-urban</u> Rural (2,500 or fewer) Other (2,500 to 49,999)

3. Interviewing Methodology

One hundred sampling points were selected that replicated the U.S. population by both geographic region and city size/type, and ten face-to-face interviews were completed within each sample point Interviewers were provided with a random starting point and proceeded to collect the data on a door-to-door basis. In addition to following this procedure, the interviewers were also provided with per sample quotas for gender, age (18-19, 20-29, 30-39, 40-49, 50-59, 60-69 and 70+) and race/ethnicity (White/Caucasian, Black/African-American, Hispanic/Latino and Asian). As the initial neighborhood did not always provide racial mixes, interviewers were allowed to change neighborhoods within the given location, in order to find particular ethnic/racial populations.

4. Field Management

Interviewers were provided with contact sheets to record all attempts at reaching a prospective respondent. Five thousand, four hundred eighty-one households were attempted, resulting in 1,002 completed interviews. Among the 4,479 households that did not generate a completed interview, there were 2,328 cases of no one at home, 1,095 refusals, either at the outset or after the interview began, and 1,066 incidences when there was no one who met the age, gender and/or race/ethnicity quota needed. The following chart presents the % breakdown of the results:

Fifteen - twenty percent of the completed interviews were randomly validated, with at least one call within each sample point. All of the validations were conducted by telephone. The questions asked were factual, as respondent opinions and behavior can change from day to day. Those questions were:

- > Age
- ▶ Race/ethnicity
- ➢ Marital status/# of people in household
- \triangleright Occupation
- ➤ Religion
- > Approximate length of interview.

Each interviewer's work and each sample point were verified.

Sixty-four interviewers were used. In most instances, interviewer assignments were one or two sample points, but four interviewers covered three points and two handled four points. Copies of the master questionnaire, interviewer instructions and show cards have previously been sent. We are shipping the completed questionnaires, with the last page, containing respondent names and telephone numbers, removed.

5. Open-ended Data

Although no coding was done for "other" responses and the four open-end questions, all of the verbatim, volunteered responses were typed and merged into the data file.

INTERVIEWER INSTRUCTIONS FOR VALUES SURVEY

Introduction

This is a multi-national study among representative national samples of adults aged 18 and older in the US and several other countries. The objective of the survey is to measure opinions and preferences relating to values. The survey findings will be compared across the countries and to the results obtained in an earlier study several years ago. We are committed to providing data of the highest quality. We therefore urge you to be careful in both sampling and administering the survey.

Locating Eligible Respondents

All American citizens aged 18 and older are eligible survey participants provided they are capable of responding to the questions. In no instance should you give the questionnaire to the respondent. Always read the questions, and where indicated, hand the respondent the appropriate show card. All interviews must be conducted face-to-face. As indicated on your assignment sheet, there are quotas for age, gender and race. In addition, all respondents must live in the city, town or area noted on the quota sheet.

Although you must meet the quota requirements, the survey can only be administered door-to-door. You cannot, therefore, merely approach friends and relatives and/or ask for referrals. We will provide a starting location for each sample point that you must use in canvassing a neighborhood. If you cannot meet the racial quota within that immediate area because it is ethnically homogeneous, please notify us and we will give you a second starting point that contains households in the needed racial category.

Always inform respondents that their answers are confidential and will not be identified with them. We have included a record-keeping form and a Kane, Parsons business card that you can use for ID. We will also send you incentive money to distribute to survey participants (\$10 per respondent).

It is important that, in addition to identifying respondent categories, you carefully and thoroughly complete the contact form. Use the codes on the form to note the outcome and reason for it with respect to each contact you make. Be sure to include all of the nonrespondents as well as those who participate.

<u>Schedule</u>

You are authorized to begin interviewing immediately upon receipt of these materials. The field period will extend six weeks from that date.

Ouestionnaire Instructions

Note that you have been assigned a unique ID number. Please enter it, as indicated at the end of the questionnaire. Also be sure to record the starting and ending time of the interview, the geographic region and the city size. As we will be validating your interviews, respondent names and phone numbers are necessary. That information will be used for verification only. There are a number of multiple response questions. In such instances, you must record a response for each item on the list. We have organized these as yes/no questions. The responses that are selected should be circled "yes" and all others circled "no". Carefully follow the instructions that tell you which questions are limited to a single response and which allow for multiple responses, and do not leave any items blank unless they are omitted because of a skip pattern. Do not read "other" (usually an "8") unless specifically instructed to do so, and never read "don't know". An example of an "other" exception is Q. 54.

Q. 21. Read the items on the list from a. to k. Record the response as "yes" if the answer hedges along the lines of "a little bit", "probably", etc.

Q. 27. Make sure that the respondent has grasped the meaning of this question and understands that "agree" means accepting the concept that humanity/a lot of human feelings is lost.

Q.32. Treat this question similarly to Q.27, but this time "agree" means that nothing can reduce the richness of human feelings.

Q. 34. Please note that this question asks the respondent to choose 2 of the 4 options. Q.50. This a multiple response question that allows the respondent to select as many items as appropriate.

Q.F3. Please make sure that the respondent understands that highest level of education means education completed, not just attended.




